French Traitors Executed In Paris

PARIS, Feb. 20.—(Reuters)—Two Frenchmen were executed here yesterday after being convicted of working for the Gestapo in France during the war. Final evidence at the trial of the two, Rene Saumande and Andre Morin, was a statement sent from Germany by their wartime secret service chief. Saumande and Morin were convicted of betraying several resistance leaders to the Germans and heading to death Frenchmen imprisoned during the occupation.
