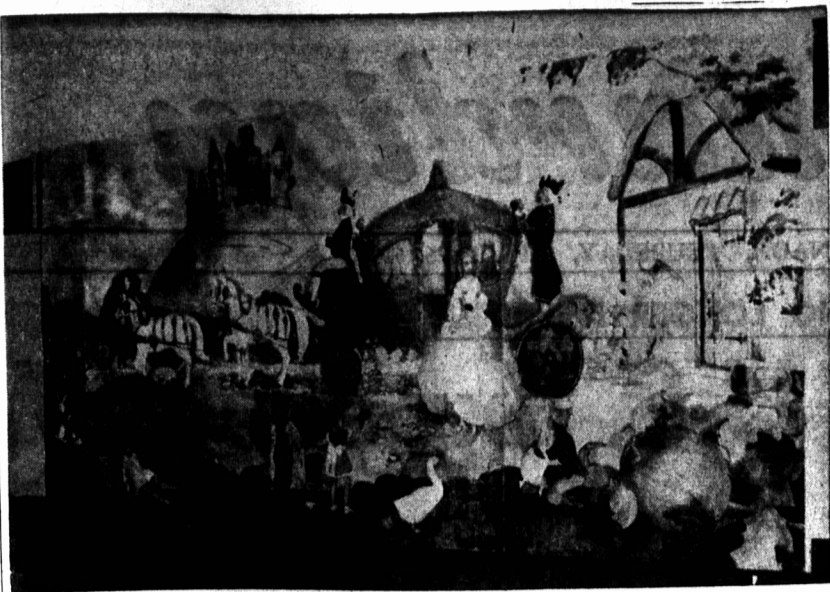
Evening Classes At Vocational School Closing

On account of the large number of students enrolled, it was necessary to hold the closing exercises on two successive nights, Monday, April 23 and Tuesday, April 24. A similar programme was carried out each night consisting of remarks by the principal, introduction of the Principals and appreciative remarks by a student member of each class a humorous contest and a delightful lunch prepared by the class in Home Economic under the supervision of Miss Doris M. Successful Polio Clinic At Spring Park Hall This Week

The sunny weather and the excellent co-operation of the children, parents and helpers contributed a great deal in making the Spring Park Hall, Monday and Parkdale Hall, Tuesday very successful. At the Spring Park clinic 177 pre-school children received their first injections of Salk vaccine, while at Parkdale 198 children were inoculated. In addition a total of thirty expectant mothers also received the injections, for the protection against polio. The clinics were conducted by Dr. Harold Stewart and Dr. Burton Howatt, Provincial Health Officer, assisted by nurses, Miss Mona Wilson, Director of Public Health Nursing, Miss Alice Trainor and Miss Ruth Ross of the Health Department. The Home and School Associations and Women's Institutes lent their support in preparing the halls and appointing ladies to assist in the registrations.
