O'LEARY — Sixteen graduates of O'Leary Regional High School received their diplomas and certificates at commencement exercises Friday night. An attendance of more than 800 guests filled the spacious school auditorium.

The principal, Earle S. Jelley acted as master of ceremonies and delivered his annual report in which he outlined future class arrangements and described the new addition to the school now under construction.

"We are fortunate in having a dedicated teaching staff," Mr. Jelley said, while expressing hope that they always remain dedicated to their profession. While commending the first commercial class for its hard work the principal stated that the school's aim is to turn out a commercial class that people would want to hire.

The program included the presentation of high school certificates and prizes to graduates: 10, 11 and 12, chorus "This Land is your Land." During the graduation exercises the boys and girls choral club rendered "Long Beach Sea" and the boys choral club sang "The B.Y. That Builds The Boat."

The valedictory was delivered by Wanda Buchanan and the address to the graduates was made by Mr. Macintosh by Roy MacLeod on behalf of the congregation. Later in the day services were held in Alberton and Cascompec.

During his two year pastorate Mr. Macintosh has given strong and effective leadership to the charge, and has also taken part in community affairs.

The services gave Social Credit 65 per cent of their vote and the New Democratic Party 4.5. The civilian vote gave Social Credit 18.6 per cent and the NDP 11.6.

In St. John's West, Mr. Browne had received 12,530 votes election night and Mr. Cahill 12,363, giving the cabinet minister a lead of 170.

Mr. Cahill, 25-year-old lawyer, received 211 service votes only 20. A recount is possible.

The 65-year-old Mr. Browne, who entered the cabinet as minister without portfolio June 21, 1957, and was appointed solicitor-general Oct. 11, 1960, was the fifth cabinet minister defeated in the election. The others were Works Minister Walker, State Secretary Dorion, Postmaster-General William Hamilton and Mines Minister Fyles.

ALBERTON — Rev. James H. Macintosh conducted his last services of worship as minister of Alberton pastoral charge of the United Church of Canada yesterday. The theme of his sermon was "The church, the ministry and you."

Following early morning worship at Beach Grove, June 23. He was born in Saint John, N.B. 32 years ago. As an infant he came with his parents to Kildare and some 15 years later they moved to Alberton.

As a young man he learned painting and carriage building. For a number of years he operated a saw mill for the late George Gard. He also engaged in carpentry and, until his retirement, was known as an efficient workman.

In 1944 he was married to Elizabeth Gilles of Montrose who predeceased him 10 years ago.

During the past few years he has been in failing health and has been living in Charlottetown, first at the Sacred Heart Home, then at Beach Grove.

He is survived by four brothers, Joseph and Fred in Alberton, Wilbert in Boston and a d. Bernard in Western Canada.

The funeral will be held Tuesday morning from the Rooney Funeral Home to the Sacred Heart Church for Requiem High Mass at 9.30 a.m.
