

# Hartinger Drives In Winners

## Sunshine Dairy Captures Island Softball Ch'ship

Big Henry Hartinger's bases-loaded, 2-run single in the last of the ninth inning broke a 4-4 stalemate and gave the Sunshine Island Dairy a 6-5 victory over the R. C. A. F. Flyers and the Prince Edward Island softball championship at Memorial Field last evening.

Flyers pitcher Norm Hanev set the stage for his own downfall when he threw, what looked to be a sure double-play ball, into right field as Apps Arsenault bounced an easy grounder to him after Pete MacIntyre, pinch-hitting for Billy Wright, had clipped a single earlier.

Reg Hughes kept the rally alive with a neat bunt single but hard-hitting Mike Connolly popped out to third.

The big crowd of fans was waiting expectantly as Hartinger stepped to the plate and cheered wildly as the clean-up man slashed a grass-cutter over second for his

third hit of the game that brought tied the Island title.

Ced Ballen started the game for the Dairy but it was brother Art, who came on in the top of the ninth, who took credit for the win, his third of the series.

Norm Hanev went the distance for the Flyers and gave up 13 hits but didn't walk a man. Ced Ballen allowed 8 hits and 4 runs during his 5th inning tenure on the mound and Art gave up 2 hits and run in his 11th-inning stint.

Playing no small part in the Dairy's close victory was their infield comprised of Apps and Len Arsenault, Billy Wright and George Bradley, that handled 28 chances and miscued on only one occasion; and Angie Carroll patrolling the centre-field pastures, who ranged far and wide to haul down 6 long flies.

Rule, Jackson and Dion played heads-up ball for the Flyers. Len Arsenault blasted the only home run of the game; a lead-off effort in the second frame that gave the Dairy a 3-0 lead.

Hartinger's singles paced the Dairy attack while Hughes, Connolly, and Apps Arsenault had two. One of Connolly's blows was a run-scoring double.

Oliver for the Flyers had three hits including a double. Dion and Jackson each bagged two singles.

The Dairy infield probably never played a better game all year and Angie Carroll shone brightly as the star of the outfield, making six putouts. Both starting pitchers were hit rather liberally but Ced and Norm were appreciably better than the other.

Neither allowed even one batter to get a free ride to first. Len and Apps Arsenault and Billy Wright played very well for the Dairy and Len slammed a long homer in the second inning that built up a 3-0 lead for the milkmen.

It was a great series all the way through, between two well-matched ball teams. However, in our humble opinion the Dairy had the edge in the hitting department, which was the secret of their success during the season in the local league and also in the Flyers' sporadic success in the playoffs.

## Keith Paris, Sam Fortuna Have Fight Money Held Up After Pitiful Display

HALIFAX (CP)—Halifax's Keith Paris and Sammy Fortuna of Montreal put on such a pitiful display in a 10-round feature bout here Tuesday that their purses have been held up and "no decision" was given.

The Halifax Boxing Commission collected the results of the judges' and referee's cards, then announced a special meeting would be held today to decide on the matter.

The dull fight that had the 2,500 fans booing from the start had little resemblance to their first meeting here last month when Paris won a split decision in a bloody brawl. Both fighters weighed in at 141½.

In the semi-final Buddy Daye of Halifax and Leroy Jones of Halifax fought to a six-round draw. Daye weighed 127½, a half-pound lighter than Jones.

Bob Leadley, 157, Dartmouth, N. S., won an unanimous six-round decision over Al Grant, 158½.

## Marilyn Bell Remains Only Swimmer To Conquer Lake

TORONTO (CP)—Marilyn Bell still is the only person ever to swim Lake Ontario.

The record of 20 hours and 56 minutes the Toronto girl set a year ago when she was only 16 remains unbroken.

Two swimmers more experienced than Marilyn lost out Tuesday in their bids to cross the lake. England's Brenda Fisher and former Hamiltonian Tom Park were forced out by rough water and a stiff southeast breeze.

Buffed by the waves and mist-errible with seasickness and stomach cramps, 27-year-old Brenda climbed unaided into her boat nine miles short of Toronto. That was 12 hours and five minutes after she plunged into the lake at Youngstown, N. Y., for the 32-mile grind.

Park, 31, who started three hours ahead of her, lasted 2½ hours longer and got within two miles of the shoreline at suburban Mimico. He suddenly became exhausted, and was dragged into an escorting boat.

He made the most determined of about 30 challenges to Marilyn's title. If he could have withstood the pounding of the wind-whipped waves long enough to reach shore he would have been the first man to swim Lake Ontario and he might have completed the crossing in less time than Marilyn took.

When taken from the sunlit water, he had been swimming approximately 17½ hours.

Until he encountered the high waves when within plain sight of shore, Park, who moved to Hamilton from his native Newcastle-Tyne, England, at the age of five, was given a good chance of completing the swim.

## Tribe Holds Lead; Boston And White Sox Hopes Dim

Cleveland Indians clung to their 1½ game lead over New York Yankees in the stern American League pennant chase by defeating the 1955 nemesis, Washington Senators, 3-1 in the first game of a two-night doubleheader Tuesday night. Mike Garcia hurled a six-hitter for the Indians.

The Yankees kept pace by whipping Detroit 6-0 in a day game as Bob Turley turned in his second consecutive shutout and sixth of the season.

But the pennant hopes of two other contenders, Chicago White Sox and Boston Red Sox, were just about extinguished.

The last-place Baltimore Orioles turned back Chicago 2-0 in the first game of an evening doubleheader, while Boston had to settle for a 4-0 margin.

The Yankees bunched five of their nine hits in two scoring innings, knocking out starter Bob Miller in the fourth with a four-run attack and hammering Steve Gromek for two more tallies in the fifth on Hank Bauer's 18th home run of the year.

Bonus baby Miller, a 20-year-old lefthander, didn't look too bad on Elston Howard sent him to the showers with a two-run triple in the fourth. But Miller, the scotless loser, pitched three scoreless innings before getting into trouble.

Turley turned in his 16th triumph against 13 defeats, walking four and fanning seven.

Ray Moore stopped Chicago on six hits while Baltimore beat Virgil Trucks who had licked them twice.

The Red Sox were fought to the wire by the A's in the twin bill at Kansas City when the bases loaded in the ninth inning of the second game when pinch-hitter Bill Stewart filed to right field for the final out. Boston's third hurler, Dick Brodowski, was chased in the ninth when he yielded two walks with two on.

Lee Kieley walked Enos Slaughter and ran up a full count on Stewart before the game-ending fly ball. Throneberry's homer in the seventh edged the Red Sox ahead 2-0 after they had blown an early lead.

Power's blow in the long, tense opener settled the issue. Astroth opened the 12th with a single advanced on a sacrifice by Tom Gorman, fourth and winning pitcher, and scored on Power's looping liner to left.

## South African Sports Leader Urges Segregation

JOHANNESBURG (Reuters)—A South African sports leader Tuesday urged international segregation of white and colored athletes.

Ludwig Japhet, honorary life president of the Transvaal National Sporting Club, argued that non-whites have natural physiological advantages over white men and should not compete with each other.

He was speaking at the annual general meeting of the club one of the leading bodies promoting professional boxing in South Africa, and which headed the movement to introduce rugby league football into the country.

Japhet contended that non-whites have a large advantage in boxing because of better physical and nervous structure.

White and non-white world champions would be good for sport and good for business, he suggested.

"Following the successes of Jesse Owens, the American Negro, and marathon runners from Japan, built differently from that of a white man," he said.

"That is why they can run faster and have greater endurance."

No Africans compete in any major sporting events in South Africa.
