## NOTES AND COMMENTS.

Ten months since the Boers invaded British territory in South Africa. Already they wish they hadn't.

A special meeting of the shareholders of the Kingston Dairying Association is to be held on the 18th inst. for the purpose of considering the advisability of erecting a branch factory at Lot 18. This looks like progress.

The Military Gazette reports that the mounted infantry question has at last received some attention at the hands of the Government. A regiment of eight companies has been organized for Manitoba and the Territories, Toronto is to have a company 104 strong, while Prince Edward Island will raise 46 men.

At one time "Canada First" was the watchword of a political party in this country. But the members of that party who may yet be living must be proud of the fact, as announced by that reliable war correspondent, Bennett Burleigh, of The Daily Telegraph, London, Eng., that the Canadians of Smith-Dorrieu's division were actually the first British infantry to set foot on Transvaal soil. As the newspaper man says: "Little wonder that they celebrated the event by lusty cheering for the Mother Country and for the Dominion that has done so much to uphold the honor of the Empire in this campaign."

L'Etoile, the new French Liberal paper at Three Rivers, Quebec, publishes the following touching appeal on behalf of Sir Wilfrid Laurier:

"Canada, the larger portion of whose population is French-Canadian, is presided over by a French Canadian-Catholic. Leave things as they are; do not, through rancour, envy or jealousy, wish to replace this French-Canadian by an Englishman, an Orangeman. Have our compatriots of the Opposition so little of the spirit of patriotism as to imagine an English Tory more in keeping at the head of affairs than a Canadian Liberal? It is not necessary to consider only if the Government is Liberal or if it is Conservative. These qualifications should not count."

The Montreal Star remarks: What we like about this appeal is its delightful frankness. A British statesman said: "What I like about the garter is that there is no damned merit about it." The same might be said about L'Etoile's argument for Sir Wilfrid. The question of merit does not arise. The one qualification for the Premiership as for the Order of the Garter is blood. A worse insult to the intelligence of the French-Canadian people could not be paid.

## THE STANDARD OIL DIVIDEND

(Montreal Star.)

On Tuesday the Standard Oil Company declared a quarterly dividend of eight dollars per share on its capital of ninety-seven and a half million of dollars.

This makes thirty eight per cent. dividends declared within nine months. In other words, this monster trust has made a net profit of at least thirty-seven millions and fifty thousand dollars out of the people of the United States and Canada during the last three quarters of a year.

This is the institution to which the Laurier Government has been kind enough to hand over the oil industry of Canada. Canadians not only have the privilege now of sharing with the people of the United States in paying this enormous tribute to American millionaires, but they have the proud satisfaction of knowing that in proportion to their respective numbers they contribute far more than their fellow-victims in the United States. Consumers in the United States pay ten cents a gallon for oil.

Consumers in Canada pay twenty five cents a gallon for oil of inferior quality. There are about seven hundred thousand houses in Canada lighted by coal oil. The families residing in these houses pay ten cents a gallon more for coal oil now than they did before the Laurier Government got into power.

The friendship of the Laurier Government for the Standard Oil Trust costs these Canadian oil consumers about two millions of dollars a year.

The Standard Oil Trust is supposed to have a "soft snap" in the United States, but if it had as soft a snap in the United States as it has in Canada it would own the whole continent within a very few years.

## FARMERS WERE DUPED.

Government Has Not Shipped Binder Twine.

WINNIPEG, Aug. 11.—Manitoba farmers were assured some time ago that a great quantity of binder twine was about to be shipped west by the Government and that agents were coming west to place it with the farmers at cost. A telegram from Kingston shows that the twine has not been shipped as yet, while so far the farmers have been unable to locate the agents. The farmers in consequence feel that they have been fooled.

## MR. BRYAN'S POLIOY.

Enunciated in Speech at Notification Ceremonial.

INDIANAPOLIS, August 10.—William J. Bryan, of Nebraska, and Adlai E. Stevenson, of Illinois, were notified yesterday in Military Park of their nominations for the offices of President and vice-President of the United States. Senator Jones, in a brief speech, introduced Congressman James B. Richardson, of Tennessee, who delivered the notification addressed. When Mr. Bryan arose to reply, a demonstration occurred which, perhaps, has never been equalled in this city. When order was restored Mr. Bryan began his address.

He referred but briefly to the silver question, devoting his remarks almost entirely to imperialism and the Philippine Islands. In concluding his address he said:

"There is an easy, honest, honorable solution of the Philippine question. It is set forth in the Democratic platform and it is submitted with confidence to the American people. This plan I unreservedly endorse. If elected, I shall convene Congress in extraordinary session as soon as I am inaugurated, and recommend an immediate declaration of the nation's purpose. First, to establish a stable form of government in the Philippine islands, just as we are now establishing a stable form of government in the Island of Cuba; second, to give independence to the Filipinos just as we have promised to give independence to the Cubans; third, to protect the Filipinos from outside interference, while they work out their destiny, just as we have protected the republics of Central and South America, and are, by the Monroe Doctrine, pledged to protect Cuba. A European protectorate often results in the exploitation of the ward by the guardian. An American protectorate gives to the nation protected the advantage of our strength, without making it the victim of our greed.

"For three quarters of a century the Monroe Doctrine has been a shield to neighboring republics and yet it has imposed no pecuniary burden upon us. After the Filipinos had sided us in the war against Spain we could not honorably turn them over to the former masters; we could not leave them to be the victims of the ambitious designs of the European nations, and since we do not desire to make them a part of us, or to hold them as subjects, we propose the only alternative, namely, to give them independence and guard them against molestation from without."

His speech was of considerable length. Cheer upon cheer greeted him at every telling period.
