## HAPPENINGS

Organists "Rather Special" was the remark by Adjutant John Churchill on the calibre of the work by students at the Halifax Musical Festival. The outstanding event to come out of opening day competitions at the Festival was the showing of organ students at a Halifax paper.

"You have something rather special here," Mr. Churchill told the audience. "Nowhere in Canada are there such a large group of well trained organ competitors. The teaching is absolutely wonderful and the students reveal that they are really keen to explore the various facets of organ music, he continued.

Because the competitors were at different stages of development and their selections were of varying difficulty, "your choice" organ solo presented difficulties of adjudication. Comparing on the basis of what was required of each selection and how well the young organist brought it off, the adjudicators awarded Wilma Wood of Halifax, a top mark of 65 and commended her for "quite outstanding phrasing."

### Plays Are To Be Acted "The Play's The Thing"

I've long believed the "Play's the Thing," and the reaction of the audience at the two performances of Hamlet by the Canadian Players of Stratford seems to prove me right. Never was there deeper concentration, closer attention. Not a cough—only bursts of appreciative laughter at the occasional passages of humor in the tragic tale. So it was on Saturday evening with the older audience and the same was true (I heard) of the audience largely of high school students.

Yet it was an audience that came through mixed motives. There were scholars, members of our thriving drama groups, and lovers of Shakespeare from homes where his plays were almost as thumb-worn as the family Bible. But many, including the young people had undoubtedly come expecting to be bored—or at least much wearied by this, one of the most "talky" of the plays, and usually considered the most "intellectual." (People do come for other reasons than interest in the occasion itself—out of a sense of duty; out of curiosity; for social reasons, etc.)

What then was the secret of the wrapt attention on the part of everyone? I do not believe it was due entirely to the rushing, impetuous, youthful interpretation of William Hutt. (Though in his acting Hamlet's words were used like swords and Hamlet became a by no means "intellectual" performance as was that of older actors I have seen.) The audience, I think, with the exception of those who had witnessed other performances, would have responded just as whole-heartedly to poorer acting.

**BROUGHT TO LIFE**  
The secret was simply that "Shakespeare" became to the majority of the audience for the first time, a living reality—not a mass of notes, or "background material" or even that remote though revered stuff full of isolated quotations that must be paraphrased, memorized— and passed on in examinations.
