MONDAY

Residents of Tignish and the surrounding area were shocked and saddened when they learned of the sudden death of Melvin Doucette, Grand Falls, N.B., which occurred on Thursday evening, April 15th, when the canoe which he was using while fishing in the Tobique River capsized throwing him into the icy water. Death is shocking in any time but for one so young to be taken so unexpectedly it is heartbreaking for the ones left to mourn as this is the second tragic death by drowning in the family. Twenty years ago Melvin's four-year-old brother, Edgar, while playing in a cove at the Black Marsh near Tignish was trapped by the rising tide and when the family realized he was missing it was too late.

Winnipeg, (CP) — Most Rev. Alfred Arthur Sinnott, first Roman Catholic Archbishop of Winnipeg, died in hospital here Sunday following a lengthy illness. He was 77.

Archbishop Sinnott governed the archdiocese from Dec. 23, 1916, three months after his consecration, until his retirement in 1946 because of ill health.

James Cardinal McGuigan of Toronto will officiate at the funeral service to be held in St. Mary's Cathedral here Thursday.

Archbishop Sinnott was born in the village of Crapaud, P. E. I., and most of his early religious instruction came from his mother.

Prowse and Mrs. Prowse at a reception for them at historic Government House. The splendid weather prevailing saw upwards of 300 teachers take advantage of the hospitality offered.

Winnipeg, (CP)—One of Manitoba's oldest citizens, 103-year-old Mrs. Julia Gallant, died Tuesday at her home here. Mrs. Gallant was born in St. Nicholas, P. E. I., and came to Manitoba 55 years ago.

Dr. Rev. R. V. MacKenzie, Rector of St. Dunstan's University, will be among three outstanding educationists of the Atlantic Provinces to receive the honorary degree of Doctor of Laws from St. Mary's University, Halifax, next month. Announcement to this effect has been made by the Most Rev. J. Gerald Berry, D.D., Chancellor of the University. The other recipients of the degree are Prof. Frederick Henry Seaton, C.B.E., former president of the Canadian Education Association and of the Nova Scotia College of Art and Mr. George Alain Frecker, Deputy Minister of Education for Newfoundland.

That an effort will be made by the Department of Education to lessen the burden on students writing entrance examinations for Prince of Wales College was forecast by Dr. L. W. Shaw, Deputy Minister of Education, when he told the annual convention of the P.E.I. Teachers Federation yesterday that consideration was being given to extending the writing period over four days instead of the present three.

The possibility of having Bruce M. Leyden, vice-president of the Calgary Lions Club, as guest speaker at their May meeting was one of the main items of business at the semi-monthly meeting of the Charlottetown Lions Club held at the Queen Hotel last evening. Lion Leyden, who has just returned from a 30,000 mile speaking tour of member clubs of Lions International in the Far East and South Pacific, has offered to come here and speak to the local club as part of his itinerary of a coast to coast speaking tour of this continent on behalf of international goodwill. The title of his talk will be "What is ahead in the Far East."

The hearts of a group of children were gladdened last night when the boys and girls of the Prince Edward Island Protestant and Saint Vincent orphanages were guests at a dress rehearsal of the Y.M.C.A. Circus which opens at the "Y" tonight. Each child was presented with a souvenir circus balloon and had an opportunity to become friendly with the clowns whose antics brought forth cheers and laughter from the little folk.

Cpl. Johnston spoke briefly explaining the scope of the picture and a number of interesting features of life in the R.C.M.P.

A Quebec manufacturer of high-class leather sandals, and boudoir slippers has indicated an interest in the possibility of establishing a branch factory in Summerside, and is expected to visit here the latter part of the month to conduct an on-the-spot survey to determine whether or not it would be practical with regard to local labor, available location, taxes, etc.

A grass fire yesterday caused the loss of a barn and contents of hay, oats and straw belonging to Mr. Walter Byrne, whose farm is located about a mile from Carigan. Mr. Byrne was away from his home, where he lives alone. At some time prior a grass fire had been started about three-quarters of a mile away near the shore.
