

### Whitey Ford Signs With N. Y. Yankees

ST. PETERSBURG, Fla. (AP)—Whitey Ford, spectacular young left handed pitcher, signed his 1954 contract with the five-time world champion New York Yankees Saturday just a few hours after

he reportedly received an ultimatum to sign within 48 hours or be cut out of the club's plans for the coming season. It is believed that the 26-year-old moundman signed for \$15,000, an increase of \$4,000 over his 1953 pay. Last season Ford rejoined the Yankees after two years in the army and won 18 games while losing only 6. It was the best pitching record in the club.

### Canada Wins 2 Games In World Hockey Series

STOCKHOLM, (CP)—A pair of easy victories against admittedly low-rated opponents shot Canada to the top of the standings in the world hockey tournament and caused experts to revise upward Toronto East York's chances of winning. The Canadian club breezed to an 8-0 victory over Norway Sunday as a follow-up to Saturday's 8-1 defeat of Switzerland to join three other favored teams—Russia, Czechoslovakia and Sweden—in first place. Some of the other favorites found the going tougher. The Czechs, picked by most of the experts before the eight-team round-robin tournament began, ran out of steam in the third period against Germany Saturday and found themselves outscored and outplayed as they hung on for a 9-4 victory.

**Finns Stubborn**  
The Swedes, who won the title last year in the absence of the other three top-rated clubs in the present tournament, needed three late goals Sunday to overcome an unexpectedly stubborn Finnish team 5-3. The Russians disposed of Norway 7-0 in Saturday's third game. Germany and Switzerland, both winless so far, played to a 3-3 tie Sunday night.

Canada's meeting with Sweden tonight (at 3 p.m. EST) will be the first clash between any of the four favored clubs and the East York club now is heavily favored on the basis of the Swedes' close call against Finland. The Finns meet Czechoslovakia and Germany faces Russia in today's remaining action. Against Norway, the Canadians

played a simple game with emphasis on scoring without too much artistry. Centre Eric Under, who scored three goals and assisted on a fourth against the Swiss Saturday, again picked up four points, scoring twice and setting up two more tallies by right-winger Bill Sluce. Norm Gray, John Petro, Bob Kennedy and Moe Galand also scored for East York.

**Evenly Played**  
Kennedy, a 23-year-old centre who played his junior hockey with Hamilton Tigers, drew a big hand from the 2,100 spectators for his goal as he stick-handled through the entire Norwegian team. The game was cleanly played, with the losers drawing five of the nine penalties imposed by the Swiss and Czech referees.

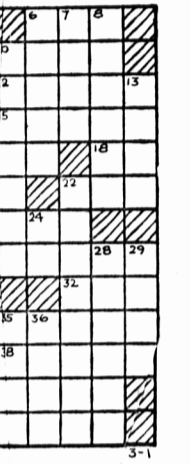

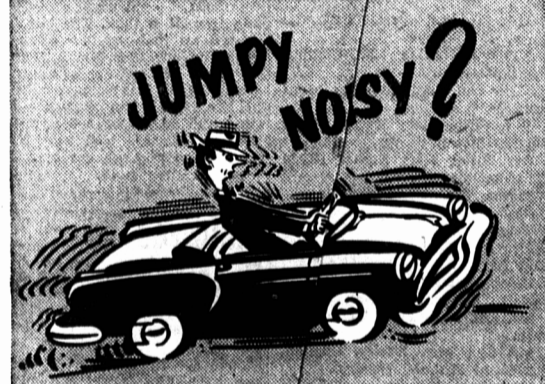

### Russia Wants Canadian Team To Tour Country

STOCKHOLM, (Reuters)—Greg Currie, trainer of Canada's world ice hockey championship team, said Sunday that Russia wants a Canadian team to tour the Soviet Union next year. Boris Miyakinkov, Soviet team leader, told Currie in an informal meeting that Soviet delegates to the World Ice Hockey Federation's congress will extend a formal invitation to Canada when it opens here today. Currie would not bind Canada to accept since the invitation would have to go through the Canadian Amateur Hockey Association.

### Former Swimming Star Eleanor Holm Granted Divorce

LAS VEGAS, Nev. (AP)—Former swimming star Eleanor Holm was granted a divorce from showman Billy Rose in a routine 15-minute court appearance Saturday. It was in marked contrast to the year-long battle of the Roses in which they aired domestic troubles after 13 years of marriage. Miss Holm, tanned from daily swimming here, charged mental cruelty. The divorce was granted by district judge A. S. Henderson. Eleanor said she is undecided about her future plans. "I have had some offers for movie, one of my life story," said the attractive brunette, but added that she hasn't made up her mind whether to accept.
