WATERSPOUT.—Yesterday, at about 12.45 p. m., our harbor was visited by a beautiful phenomenon. Immense drops of rain were falling, when a column descended from the clouds over the water near the "three tides" until within a few feet of the water, when a second met it from below, forming a waterspout about ten feet in diameter. The water seemed to boil for yards on all sides, while the rest of the harbor was beautifully calm. Beyond the dark patch over-head the light blue sky, half hidden by masses of white silver-tipped clouds, formed a pleasing background to the strange and unusual scene. The spout continued to whirl around for fully ten minutes, when it parted and quickly ascended, leaving the water as before. A few minutes afterwards a second column began to descend nearer the shore in front of Government House, but slowly rose again before reaching the water. A singular whirling motion was perceptible in the clouds in the vicinity of the spouts, until nearly two o'clock, when several peals of thunder were followed by a short, but a heavy fall of rain.

THE "INTERNATIONAL GUIDE."—A young man from Cape Breton has been playing the "Guide" for some months back between this port and ports in Nova Scotia and Cape Breton. This fellow, or fraud, has gone so far as to issue through tickets to New York, Boston, and elsewhere. He represents that his tickets are far more advantageous to travellers than tickets purchased from the Steamboat Companies, as such "Guides" as himself take charge of travellers arriving at stations or ports where they are stationed. Such is by no means the case. This "Guide of ours" got into a very tight place on the steambot sailing from Hawksbury to Pictou on Saturday last; and when questioned about his "through tickets," "great hotel," etc., craved the mercy of his questioner and confessed that he was in a rather awkward position. With the assistance of a detective he was obliged to produce a number of checks he fraudulently obtained from strange travellers. The free ticket of passage he obtained from Mr. Hales was taken from him, and he was obliged to pawn his trunk for his passage from Hawksbury to Pictou. When he arrived at the latter place, he took himself to parts unknown.

### A SEA MONSTER.

One of those eight-armed monsters known as the octopus or devil-fish has just been received by the Aquarium, and, although not near so large, it is precisely the same kind of fish as the one made famous by Victor Hugo in his "Toilers of the Sea." It was captured in the gulf stream. The tentacles, or arms of the creature, when extended, measure over two feet, and its entire length is over three feet. It is constantly changing its color and flashes like subdued and faint heat lightning, emitting a kind of flashing electric blue and green color. The power of expanding and contracting itself is shown in a marked manner; sometimes it is apparently but one foot in length. When at the bottom of the tank it amuses itself by throwing its powerful arms over the edges of the adjoining tank. This is the first of these monsters ever exhibited in this country, and quite an interest is attached to it from the celebrity it has attained in the past. —N. Y. Herald.

### Latest from Montreal.

MONTREAL, Aug. 20.

Messrs. S. J. Caxton & Co., wholesale dry goods dealers, have been robbed of \$20,000 worth of silks. The storeman is concerned in the robbery, and he has been arrested.

The majority against the Dunkin Act in Toronto is rapidly increasing.

The Premier held a Levee here to-day, but very few attended.

Hon. Peter Mitchell has returned from a long canvass in his county—Northumberland—and reports a strong feeling against the existing Government.

### WAR DISPATCHES.

A SKIRMISH

The Turks Concentrated.

(Special Dispatch to Daily Examiner.)

LONDON, August 20.

The Russians made a demonstration on Saturday with thirty-five thousand men at Erzeroum, evidently for the purpose of discovering the strength of the enemy. Only a small skirmish occurred.

The Russians are enlisting a great host to arms.

The new headquarters of the Czar are near Plevna.

Suleiman Pasha has joined Mehemit Ali—making a large army.

LONDON, Aug. 19.

A correspondent, commenting on the summoning of the Russian guard to the seat of war, says that the guard was long retained near St. Petersburg on account of probable action on the part of England. Its removal, therefore, is reassuring, as it gives emphasis to the promise that the English interests will not be threatened.

CONSTANTINOPLE, Aug. 19.

The Ottoman Bank has succeeded in placing a loan which will net the Porte \$12,000,000.

LONDON, Aug. 19.

A state of siege has been proclaimed in Salonica.

Osman Pasha has advanced within twenty miles of Sistova Bridge.

Eight vessels landed a body of Turks in Dobruscha on Friday. The Russians are marching to oppose them.

Official despatches state that the Russians batteries at Giurgevo were silenced by the Turkish batteries at Rustchuk on the 17th inst.

BUCHAREST, Aug. 18.

General Gourkha declares that the Russian position from the Danube to Shipka Pass is so strong that the Turks will not venture to attack it. Both armies are constantly entrenching. The Turks especially hold a wonderfully strong position at Plevna, but Osman Pasha is nevertheless in a difficult situation because of the numerous cavalry attached to the 80,000 Russians who are confronting him and completely cut off his communication with Sofia and capture his convoys of ammunition and provisions. The Russians will not undertake any operations until the whole guard arrives from St. Petersburg. This signifies a pause of a fortnight or three weeks.

BUCHAREST, August 18th.

A letter says the main hope of the Russians now is that of a decisive victory at Tirnova, which, if accomplished, the Czar will be ready for peace at once.

ERZEROU, Aug. 19.

An official telegram from Mukhtar Pasha states that on Saturday the Russians, numbering 35,000 infantry, ten regiments of cavalry and 110 guns, attacked Mukhtar along the whole line, extending from Magarajuk to Yankinar. The cannonade was commenced at seven o'clock in the morning, and at six in the evening the Russians retreated in good order to their encampment, pursued by the Turks. The Turks lost 164 killed and wounded, and the Russians lost 1,200.

PARIS, Aug. 19.

The Figaro, which lately attacked Duke De Broglie, President of the Council and Minister of Justice, as being an obstacle to the proclamation of a state of siege, now makes similar complaints against General Bertharets. It charges Ducrot, who commands at Bourges, with being the instigator of these attacks.

The Moniteur thinks it quite allowable that Ducrot, approving a policy of force, should regret not being in the Cabinet to carry out this programme, but considers it deplorable and serious that he should stimulate a break up of the Ministry.
