UNITED WE STAND!

THE PIONEER has suggested that a second Board of Trade be organized at Summerside. This suggestion is worthy of consideration. Certainly it is desirable that the business men of Summerside have a means of expressing their opinions and exerting their influence upon the powers that be. The same remark may be made as to Souris, Alberton, Georgetown and other business centres. But we cannot see why the object desired may not be obtained by local councils in affiliation with the Charlottetown Board of Trade,—changed, if need be, into the Prince Edward Island Board of Trade. If we have two or three or four separate Boards of Trade, the tendency will be to division rather than union to weakness rather than strength. But if we have one united Board of Trade in which the various councils of the different towns will be represented, that Board will have increased influence, command additional respect, and be so much the more useful to the Province. Charlottetown has no interest apart from the Province at large. We believe that we rightly interpret the sentiment of the business men of Charlottetown when we say that there is no desire on their part to "get inside" the business men of Summerside or any other part of the Province. Broadly speaking, the interest of one community in this Province is the interest of all; and the interest of one and all will be promoted by working together rather than working apart. We, therefore, commend to the business men of the Province the idea of making the Charlottetown Board of Trade more comprehensive and strong. While it is true that the Charlottetown Board of Trade has had constantly in view the promotion of the prosperity of the Province at large, it is but reasonable to suppose that it would be very much more effective if it were strengthened by the co-operation of the business men outside of Charlottetown. United, we go ahead; divided, we are too small and weak to obtain many of the advantages to which we are entitled.

The President of the Charlottetown Board of Trade has already, we are informed, approached several of the leading business men of Summerside with a view to the organization of a Summerside Board of Trade to co-operate with that of Charlottetown; and we feel sure that he and the Council of the Board of Trade in Charlottetown will be glad to promote in any way that may be deemed advisable, the mutual co-operation which is so desirable. We suggest Local Councils in connection with a General Board of Trade for the Province as a feasible scheme for the effective organization of the business men of Prince Edward Island, and commend it to the attention of all concerned.

### A NEW DEPARTURE.

The shipment, to-day, of three hundred barrels of choice apples directly to the British market is a new departure for Prince Edward Island and a very gratifying sign of the times. The apples have, for the most part, been carefully selected and packed under the supervision of Senator Ferguson and Mr. John Robertson of Inkerman Farm. We hope and believe that they will be regarded by the English purchasers as "a fine lot" for which good prices will be paid. Part of Mr. Robertson's shipment (all or nearly all of which was produced in his own orchard) is put up in boxes with slats on the sides, showing the colour and quality of the fruit to advantage and admitting the fresh air. Senator Ferguson has given close personal care not only to the selection of his own shipment but also to that of the Prince Edward Island Fruit Growers Association. We feel sure that both consignments will be found creditable to him and to the Province, and be the precursors of a profitable trade in P. E. Island apples in the years that are to come. However this may be, the new venture is highly creditable to all concerned in it.

### ANGER IN FRANCE.

Everybody Everywhere Discussing the News With Furious Rage.

NEW YORK, Nov. 8.—The Paris correspondent of the Herald says:—"Anger, impotent anger, is the one passion felt here to-day. French pride has received a blow which will not easily or soon be forgotten. It is not the evacuation of Fashoda that is resented. It is the fact of England having insisted upon an unconditional withdrawal. This is felt to be a humiliation, everywhere and by everybody the news is discussed with furious rage, yet what else could France do than recall Major Marchand? There is no statesman here reckless enough to emulate Spain and say she could die. That is all very well for what Lord Salisbury defined as decaying nations, but for one that is in the full plenitude of her vigour it would be an absurdity. Most people approve the Government's action, while storming against the condition of affairs here that makes any other impossible. It was felt that Marchand's success deserved recompense. Few, if any, people dreamed he would stop at Fashoda. Almost all seem to have expected that France would receive something valuable territorially in return for it, and on the principle that a bird in the hand is worth two in the bush, the nation wanted the compensation to come before the evacuation. England's unbending attitude has killed all these hopes, so although with the disappearance of the risk of war there has come a noticeable relief to the public state of mind, there is also a feeling that France has been ill-used and humiliated."
