Montague Board Of Trade Critical Of Phone Service

MONTAGUE — At a meeting of the Montague Board of Trade held last night, it was decided to forward a letter to the Island Telephone Company requesting information on when the residents of Montague and surrounding areas could expect a more modern and efficient telephone system.

One of the members suggested that the telephone company should donate the present switch board to the Garden of the Gulf Museum as an antique piece of equipment.

The board contains more than 200 outlets, many of them carrying five or more subscribers. The members felt that the service offered by the Montague

telephone office was far from adequate through no fault of the operators, but due wholly to the outdated equipment with which they worked.

Following the business meeting, it was decided to hold a ladies night on Dec. 17th, beginning with a banquet at the Bison Res-

taurant. Alan Nelson was appointed to complete the arrangements.

It was also decided to sponsor an APEC dinner early in the new year and arrangements for this dinner will be made at the December meeting.

Hunters Fined In S'ide Court

SUMMERSIDE — Two Alberton hunters and two from Montrose were fined by Magistrate W. Chester S. MacDonald in Magistrate's Court here yesterday, for using a live bird as a decoy.

Silas Henry Matthews and Haldine Bertram Matthews of Alberton were each fined \$75 and costs or 15 days in jail. Lloyd George Dunbar and Henry Alfred Gillian, of Montrose drew \$65 fines and costs or 15 days. All four pleaded guilty to the charge.

Dunbar and Gillian were also found guilty of hunting game birds without a licence and Dunbar was fined \$11 and costs. The fine on Gillian includes the cost of a licence while Gillian's licence had previously been cancelled.

Another Game Act case, that of Patrick Howard Doucette of Mt. Tryon charged with allowing sawdust to enter a stream which was frequented by trout, was adjourned to Dec. 22.

Theft Case Dismissed

SUMMERSIDE — Following the completion of the evidence in the preliminary hearing of Leonard Philip Thibeau of Kensington, in County Magistrate's court here Wednesday afternoon, Magistrate W. Chester S. MacDonald dismissed the case against the accused.

Magistrate MacDonald based his dismissal on the fact that insufficient evidence had been produced to warrant bringing the case before the higher court.

Thibeau was charged with breaking and entering the store of Waldron Darrach of Kensington and committing an indictable offence therein. The accused was apprehended by town constable Vernon Reeves, early Sunday morning.

The Magistrate also noted that the store owner had been unable to identify some of the articles which were alleged to have been stolen from his store, although he did identify a cash box and four receipts therein. However, he couldn't say when he had last seen the receipts, and in any case they were of no monetary value.

Although the disease has been stemmed, no cure for it has yet been found.

Death Due To Injuries Coroner's Jury States

A coroner's jury here last night found that William Arnold Harvey came to his death on Oct. 2, 1959, at 11.45 at the O'Leary Community Hospital, due to injuries received in a car-truck accident on the highway at Inverness, on Sept. 21, 1959, at 10.15.

The inquest was held in the Prince County Court House and was presided over by Coroner Dr. W.E. Callaghan.
Witnesses heard last night included Dr. Nikola Bruvelis, O'Leary, who examined the injured man following his arrival at the hospital; Alan MacDonald, Inverness, at whose home a phone call for a doctor was made; and

Mrs. George Albert Phillips, Inverness housewife who observed the car parked in front of her home that evening and that the lights of the vehicle were not on.
A report of the assistant pathologist, Dr. Robert Abel, Charlottetown was read by Dr. Callaghan.

In his report, Dr. Abel attributed death to fractured ribs and internal injuries.

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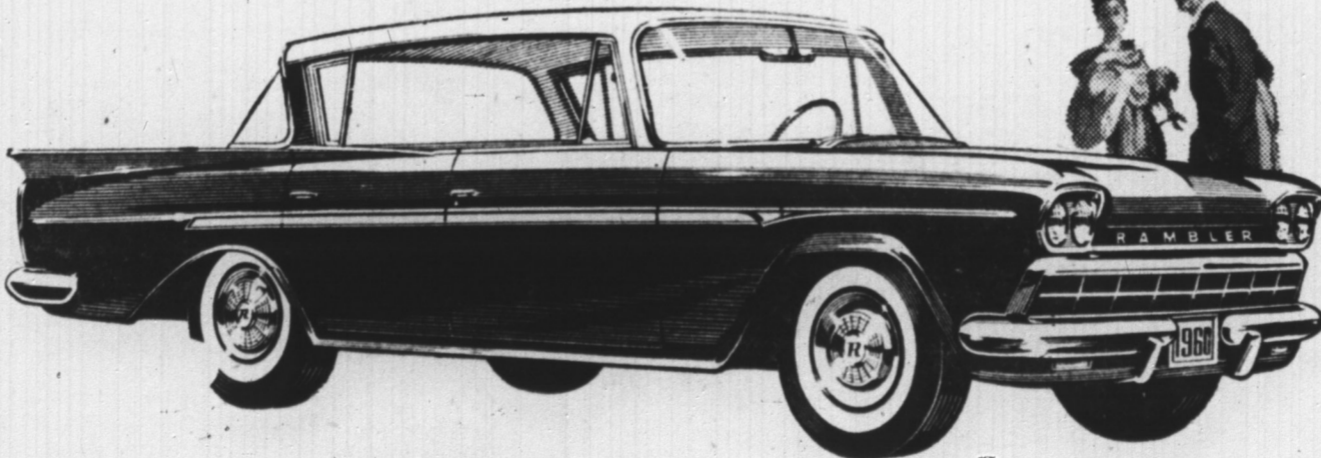
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Alberton Fire Brigade Planning New Station
