Syria, Iraq Announce New Gov'ts

DAMASCUS (CP-Reuters)—Syrian Premier Salah Eddin Bitar returned to power and named a new cabinet Monday after being out of office for only two days, Damascus radio reported.

Meanwhile, in Iraq, a new government was announced Monday in which new ministers for finance and housing were named and a new cabinet post in charge of "Arab unity affairs" was created.

The 21-member Iraqi government is headed by Premier Maj.-Gen. Ahmed Hassan Bakr, who submitted the resignation of the old government Saturday, only a few hours before the Syrian cabinet, which shares the aim of joining an Arab federation led by Egyptian President Nasser, had quit.

Bitar, a co-founder of the Arab Ba'ath Socialist Party, resigned Saturday and was replaced briefly as premier by Sam Al Jundi, a long-time supporter of Nasser.

A former teacher, 31-year-old Bitar has been premier since March 5, the day after an army officers coup established the ruling National Revolutionary Council here.

In the new cabinet announced by Damascus radio, Bitar became premier and acting foreign minister.

Driver Remanded On Two Charges

VANCOUVER (CP)—The British Columbia fishing industry has hailed Prime Minister Pearson's announcement that Canada will move soon to establish a 12-mile fishing limit off her coasts.

Ken Campbell, secretary of the Fisheries Association of B.C., representing fishing companies, said: "We recommended the 12-mile limit in a submission to the government in 1957. We are not so much concerned with American fishermen, who have fished off our shores for years, as with the Japanese and Russians who could fish within three miles of the Canadian coast."

Homer Stevens, secretary treasurer of the Independent United Fishermen and Allied Workers Union, said the 12-mile limit was something "we have been fighting for years."

Credit Manager Responsibilities Are Outlined

Addressing delegates attending the 67th annual credit congress of the American National Association of Credit Management, Mr. Ross said "we hear much of the customer's character, capacity and capital—but the post-mortems on bad debts often indicate that the initial credit decision was based to a much greater degree on faith, hope and charity."

He said that whatever the nature of the customer's business the credit man should be able to properly assess its economic viability, particularly when the amount of credit involved is large or when the customer's capital is limited.

The credit man, he said, must understand the problems of the different kinds of customers his company deals with.

"This may mean having a thoroughgoing knowledge of the operational details, both technical and financial, of certain types of business. In other cases this main concern is to keep himself abreast of economic conditions within his territory as they affect broad categories of accounts and to keep himself informed as to the financial condition of his larger risks."

Some 4,200 United States and Canadian financial and credit executives are attending the 67th annual congress which winds up Wednesday.
