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CANADA DECLARES WAR WITH GERMANY

Warsaw Resists Terrific German All-day Assault

British Pay Warm Tribute To Polish Resistance Against Great Odds.

BUDAPEST, Sept. 11 (Monday)—Warsaw was subjected to an all-day airplane, tank and artillery attack Sunday as invading German armies tried to take the capital, the Warsaw radio stated today.

Forty Air Raids

Earlier the radio said 40 air raids were made on the city during the day. Captain Lipinski said Polish anti-aircraft batteries had destroyed 15 German bombers which fell in the city proper and its suburbs, and declared the defenders had captured many Germans, including the crews of two tanks which were destroyed.

Tanks Destroyed

"After sunset" said the officer. German tanks in drives attacked Warsaw from the suburbs, but were driven back. Two of them were destroyed, and their crews

ROME WARMS TO AXIS PARTNER IN CONFLICT

Talk Begins Of Assisting Germans In Crushing France.

ROME, Sept. 10—Italy today exhibited increased partiality toward her axis partner, Germany. Although Premier Mussolini kept secret his plans and continued a policy of neutrality in the European war, the controlled Fascist press praised what it described as the efficiency of Germany's invasion of Poland with admiration and enthusiasm.

The newspapers tended to ridicule Great Britain and France for the absence of any large-scale offensive on the western front and charged that Britain had violated the neutrality of Belgium, The Netherlands and Denmark.

The authoritative Fascist editor, Virginio Gayda, wrote in La Voce d'Italia that Britain appeared to be fighting these neutral states rather than Germany and warned them to be vigilant.

The attitude of the press was reflected to a considerable extent among the populace. Since Italians had been told that their military alliance with Germany required them to go to her aid immediately, if the Reich became involved in war, many of them had expected to be plunged into the conflict at once.

On learning this was not to be the case, their first feeling was one of relief and an evidence of diminishing ardor in some quarters for the Rome-Berlin axis.

In recent days, however, the exhibition of German prowess in Poland evoked new enthusiasm and there was more talk, especially among young Fascists, of Italy eventually joining sides with Germany to crush France.

At the same time there was evidence that Italy does not expect to go to war in the near future in the opening of the Levantine Fair, at Bari, as scheduled, in which a number of foreign nations are participating.

French Troops Resume Attack On Western Front

Push Ahead Despite Counter-offensive — Berlin Takes First Notice Of Franco-German Conflict.

BASEL, Switzerland, Sept. 11—(Monday)—(AP)—Shock troops of Germany's Siegfried Line, operating under a heavy curtain of fire from their own forts, launched a series of night raids for the second time on newly captured French positions in the German Saarland last night and early today.

Reports reaching Switzerland indicated these attacks met with varying successes.

Britain Renews Pledge As Canada Declares War

Conflict May Last Three Years Before Europe Is Rid Of Hitlerism, Is Belief.

LONDON, Sept. 10—The King received Hon. Vincent Massey, Canadian High Commissioner, in audience today and shortly afterwards issued a proclamation that "in the name of His Majesty's Privy Council in Canada" the Dominion is at war with Germany.

The proclamation of Canada's entry came as Great Britain, emerging from its first week of war, renewed its pledges to fight until Hitlerism no longer threatens Europe.

Mr. Massey presented to the King the recommendation of the Canadian Government that a proclamation should be issued declaring war between Canada and the German Reich.

His Majesty signified his assent and a short time later the declaration of war was made in his name at Ottawa 3,000 miles away.

Shifting Scenes In Second Week Of New Conflict

Germany launched a counter-attack on her western front Sunday to halt invading French forces. France, checked by this fighting in the north, shifted her attack to the south and reported advances in the Vosges foothills.

Canada declared war on Germany, following Great Britain by exactly one week.

MOSCOW SENDS TROOPS TO WEST FRONTIER

Roumania Fearful Of Soviet "Intentions" Calls More Men To Colors.

MOSCOW, Sept. 10—(AP)—Thousands of reserve troops poured through Moscow today bound for the west after Soviet Russia for the first time disclosed officially that reservists had been called to the colors.

These Soviet official news agency announced that "in connection with the German-Polish war which is assuming a more and more wide and threatening character," the Soviet had called up reservists in

BUCHAREST, Sept. 10—(AP)—The Rumanian Government, with more than 1,000,000 men already under arms, has called to the colors several additional classes. It was learned in official quarters tonight.

The action was taken simultaneously with the calling up of reservists in great numbers in Turkey, Rumania's ally.

Official quarters have expressed fears regarding the "Intentions" of Soviet Russia on Rumania's eastern frontier.

Official confirmation that reserves were being called up coincided with other developments of a precautionary nature.

Russia Strengthens Frontier

Russia continued strengthening her western frontier. It was understood the Government was requisitioning certain supplies in large quantities, especially sugar.

Many regular trains were running late as a result of the westward movement of troops. While most of the reservists were in uniform, some wore civilian clothes as they boarded the trains.

Official confirmation that reserves were being called up coincided with other developments of a precautionary nature.

It was claimed that several British firms had cancelled production of lathes and presses ordered by the Soviet; a Tax statement estimated that "the actions of English firms and British Government organs are blowing up trade between the U. S. S. R. and England."

Proclamation Of War

OTTAWA, Sept. 10—(CP)—Following is the text of the proclamation published today in an extra edition of the Canada Gazette declaring a state of war exists between Canada and Germany:

OTTAWA, Sunday, September 10, 1939.
PROCLAMATION

Tweedsmuir (L. S.)
Canada
George the Sixth, by the grace of God of Great Britain, Ireland and the British Dominions beyond the seas King, defender of the faith, Emperor of India.

To all to whom these presents shall come or whom the same in anywise concern,
Greeting:

A proclamation Ernest Lapointe, Attorney General, Canada
Whereas by and with the advice of our Privy Council for Canada we have signified our approval of the issue of a proclamation in the Canada Gazette declaring that a state of war with the German Reich exists and has existed in our Dominion of Canada as and from the 10th day of September, 1939;

Proclamation Is Issued By Gov. General

C.C.F. Leader And Liberal Quebec Members Are Only Oppositionists.

OTTAWA, Sept. 10—Canada officially entered the war against Nazi Germany today when the Government gave effect to the almost-unanimous will of Parliament.

For the first time in history, the senior Dominion of the British Commonwealth, on its own account and by its own will, exercised the most awesome prerogative of nationhood by declaring a state of war. In 1914, the Government merely published the British war proclamation

ISSUES PROCLAMATION
Just 13 hours after the House of Commons signified its approval of the Government's proposal to throw Canadian men and resources into war for the second time in 25 years, a Royal Proclamation was issued by Lord Tweedsmuir, Governor General, on the authority of King George VI announcing a state of war with Germany exists as and from today.

Parliament expressed its will late Saturday night at the special session by adopting the address in reply to the Speech from the Throne, traditional method of giving approval to general Government policies.

Previously Prime Minister Mackenzie King told the House that adoption of the Address would give the Government authority to declare a state of war.

The special session now will consider necessary legislation and imposition of new taxes and votes for money to pay for Canada's war effort. The Prime Minister gave notice that tomorrow the Commons would be asked to go into committee of ways and means to consider taxes and into committee of supply for the appropriation of funds.

WAR BUDGET

A war budget also may be brought down tomorrow.

During the debate on the Address in the Commons Saturday, 100,000,000 were raised in disapproval of the Government's attitude but the Senate gave its approval unanimously after only six senators had spoken.

J. S. Woodsworth, veteran leader of the Co-operative Commonwealth Federation, broke with his own followers to oppose Canada's participation in the conflict and three French-speaking members from Quebec voiced their opposition.

LIBERAL MEMBERS OPPOSE
Liguori Lacombe (Lib. Laval-Two Mountains) and Wilfrid Lacroix (Lib. Quebec, Montmorency) moved and seconded an amendment to the Address expressing regret the Government had not seen fit to advise the Governor General that Canada could not

participate in the war. They were alone in supporting the amendment when the vote was called, although earlier Maxime Raymond (Lib. Beauharnois-Laprairie) spoke against participation in a stand against the war.

Unless five members stand to demand a recorded vote, decisions of the House of Commons are taken "on shouts of 'yes' and 'no,'" says Mr. Lacombe and Mr. Lacroix stood but three more were needed. A minute later on the main motion to adopt the Address, Mr. Woodsworth stood to signify his opposition but again there was no recorded vote and the motion was adopted.

CONSERVATIVES UNANIMOUS
Every single political party represented in the House rallied to the support of the Government in its war policy. Conservatives under Hon. Dr. R. J. Manion gave unquestioning support.

Social Credit under John Blackmore raised no objection but urged universal conscription of wealth, industry and manpower as the best means of contributing to victory.

M. J. Coldwell of Rosemont-Biggar was spokesman for the C. C. F. in view of Mr. Woodsworth's dissent. That group favored economic aid to the Allies but opposed an expeditionary force and conscription.
