Als' Perry Moss Outlines Busy Program To Scribes

MONTREAL (CP) — Perry Moss, newly-acquired coach of Montreal Alouettes, spoke before a press luncheon Wednesday and outlined a three-point program for himself. From here on he will be busy with recruiting, with reorganization of the Alouette staff and with many phases of football itself. The 33-year-old coach arrived in Montreal Tuesday night from Tallahassee, Fla., where he has just completed a season as athletics director and coach at Florida State University. He has a dual job with Alouettes—as head coach and as general manager. Since the Als' season ended Coach Douglas (Pea-head) Walker and General manager Gorman Kennedy have been let out. Moss was accompanied to Montreal by his wife and two young sons.

Aces Take Royals On Here Tonight

The biggest crowd of the season will be bound for the Sports Arena tonight for their first glimpse of Charlie Hogan's P.E.I. Aces of Summerside who are in town for an Island Senior Hockey League battle with Sandy Frizzell's Parkdale Royals. It's the second meeting of the year between these two fine clubs and each squad managed a victory in the two games played at Summerside's Civic Stadium. Last Friday the Aces whipped the Royals 7-4 but Frizzell got his revenge Monday night with a convincing 6-2 triumph. However word has it that the Aces were below par for that engagement. It was their third game in four nights and weariness caught up with them. Tonight they skate out on the Arena ice after three days rest and they're confident they give the Parkdalers the greatest kind of a battle. Local fans will see Eustace Reeves tonight on the Royals' defence battling with his former teammates. It should provide plenty of action when Reeves and his Summerside friends tangle. Both teams are expected to ice their strongest lineups in an effort to pull out the verdict. Action gets underway at 8.30 sharp.

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Frick Thinks Trading Rule May Prove Harmful Later

ST. PETERSBURG, Fla. (AP) — Commissioner Ford Frick, a stout antagonist of the new inter-league trading rule, thinks an extended process of player-swapping between the American and National leagues might eventually prove harmful to baseball. Frick made the statement Wednesday at the minor leagues convention here while club officials were huddling in attempts to add to the five deals already engineered since the origin of the inter-league trading rule. It went into effect Nov. 21 and expires Dec. 15. This new rule dispenses with the formality of getting waivers on players before they can be traded from one league to another. "I'm still not convinced the inter-league rule is a good thing," Frick said. "The next thing you know, they'll want it during the regular season, too. That would be a real tragedy." "Then you'd really hear such silly talk as fixed races," he added in a half-serious, half-jesting vein.

In his reference to a tragedy, the commissioner was referring to reports that Hank Greenberg of the Chicago White Sox and Frank Lane of Cleveland Indians had advocated recently that a similar three weeks trading period be permitted between the two leagues during the summer. **NO SUSPICION** Frick conceded that not one of the five deals made so far—all of inter-league nature — could arouse suspicion of collusion between clubs. "So far they haven't made a deal that could not have been made without the new rule. They could have received waivers on the players involved." The commissioner vehemently opposed the inter-league trading rule when it originally was passed by the club owners last December. He pleaded for reconsideration at a summer meeting. The owners took another vote and passed it again by the same

margin—7-1 in the American and 5-3 in the National. The commissioner is empowered to vote on such issues only if the two leagues are deadlocked. Three of the five inter-league deals were made during the current convention. The latest was the one between St. Louis and Baltimore which sent outfielder Bob Nieman to the Cardinals in exchange for catcher-outfielder Gene Green. The Cards also threw in Chuck Staniland, a catcher with their Rochester farm team.

OTTAWA (CP)—Electric power production in Canada for the first 10 months of this year was up 6.7 per cent from last year's comparative total. The bureau of statistics placed January-October output at 84,762,249 megawatt hours, compared with 79,437,989 in the corresponding 1958 period.

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PIE PLATE STREUSEL

1. Scald 1/2 c. milk. Stir in 1/2 c. granulated sugar, 1 tsp. salt, 1/4 c. butter or Blue Bonnet Margarine. Cool to lukewarm.
2. Meantime, measure into large bowl 1/2 c. lukewarm water. Stir in 1 tsp. granulated sugar. Sprinkle with contents of 1 envelope Fleischmann's Active Dry Yeast. Let stand 10 mins. THEN stir well.
3. Turn out on floured board, knead until smooth and elastic. Mix in 1 tsp. grated orange rind, 1/2 c. currants, 2 c. (about) once-sifted all-purpose flour.
4. Punch down dough. Turn out on floured board; knead until smooth. Divide into 2 equal portions; shape into smooth balls. Roll out into 7" rounds. Place each in a greased pie plate (8 1/2" top inside measure). Grease tops. Cover with towel. Let rise until doubled—about 45 mins.
5. Combine 1/2-c. lightly-packed brown sugar, 1/4 c. flour, 1/2 tsp. grated nutmeg and 2 tbsps. melted butter or margarine. Brush dough generously with melted butter or margarine; sprinkle with crumble. Bake in mod. oven, 350°, 20 to 25 mins. Yield: 2 streusels.

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
