- (8) A comparison of the old and new parachute. The new chute, right, cuts down percentage of possible casualties in para drops.
- (9) The first army-developed postwar radio set. In forward areas, where noise could mean life or death, the softest whisper can be transmitted with excellent reception.

Bank Review Sees Threat Of Higher Prices In Boom

MONTREAL (CP)—Threat of higher prices lurks in Canada's present prosperity, says the current business review of the Bank of Montreal, and it indicates that some lessening in proposed activity may be desirable.

A recent government forecast had put this year's planned capital investment in a new plant, equipment and housing at \$7,500,000,000—"a remarkable" 21-per-cent increase over 1955's record.

With business already operating at or near capacity and with a number of materials already scarce, there was question as to whether the full program could be carried out, and danger that the attempt might involve competitive bidding up of prices.

For nine months or more the Bank of Canada had pursued a policy of credit restraint—accompanied by a noticeable rise in interest rates—and in the current situation this could hardly be surprising.

Dearer money, says the review, presumably acts in some measure as a deterrent to capital expenditures and thus reduced the demand for goods and services.

TURN TO NEW YORK

Further, in this instance, higher interest rates in Canada than in the United States might be expected to encourage some Canadian borrowers to turn to the New York market for long-term funds, and would also make investment in Canada more remunerative for buyers of Canadian securities in the United States and elsewhere.

The effect would be to stimulate a flow of capital into Canada, thus increasing the supply of foreign exchange to pay for higher merchandise imports.

There seemed little doubt that the capital investment program was more than sufficient to keep the economy operating at full capacity.

If, through monetary and fiscal measures, part of the proposed capital expenditures could be postponed until the supply of necessary materials and equipment became more plentiful, it might be possible to prolong prosperity while avoiding the strain of inflation.

New Development In Current Drive Against Stalin Cult

MOSCOW (Reuters)—The Soviet Army newspaper Red Star Friday attacked "the vicious and harmful and concealing shortcomings in actions of Soviet troops."

This criticism is regarded here as part of the current campaign against the Stalinist "cult of personality" and follows top-level calls for a new approach toward a more truthful writing of history in the Soviet Union.

Many Russian history books gloss over the Soviet Army's defeats while nearly all put Stalin in the role of the nation's greatest war leader.

Red Star, which was commenting on a book called "Rout of Fascist Troops in Byelo-Russia," by K.A. Malynin, said it contained "distortions of historical facts and this was 'typical of many books on war history published earlier.'"

The Red Star review said: "Each operation during the patriotic war had its own specific features and characteristic difficulties. There were mishaps in the direction of units and detachments which led to unjustified losses in life and material."

"However, it is often the case that booklets and volumes dedicated to the operations of the last
