Federation Of Agriculture Gives Support Price Views

Though agreeing that the Federal Government should provide support prices for agricultural products the P. E. I. Federation of Agriculture in a policy committee meeting felt that the price should not be so high as to stimulate substantial increases in production. The meeting also felt that 'forward pricing' was not feasible in this country where surpluses are either in effect or close. The belief was expressed that such a policy might work better in an importing country such as Great Britain.

It was also agreed that the Canadian Federation of Agriculture at this time cannot reasonably do more than advocate production to meet the home market and known export outlets, until such time as a further program could be developed for handling what could be small surpluses that would otherwise effect the whole volume of production.
Other Suggestions
Other suggestions offered included a greater advocacy of producer marketing boards, meetings by the P. E. I. Federation directors with the staff of the Federal Experimental Farm and support of the Federal control of radio and television. The present lower prices on farm products was also remarked and a suggestion made that the Canadian Federation continue its watching brief on freight rates.
While admitting the desirability of a larger population for Canada the meeting felt that there should be a careful selection of individuals admitted from the stand-

point of character and education. It was, too, the opinion of the meeting that the incoming volume should be based on the rapidly with which the immigrants can be assimilated into our population, and with a minimum of segregation in nationalistic groups. A suggested resolution from the Maritime Federation of Agriculture took into account that while there is no known method of producing exactly what existing markets will absorb the existence of even a small surplus can have a serious effect on the price structure of all production. It also suggested that the Government of Canada be asked to institute a support price policy for livestock and livestock products and accept responsibility for the disposal of surpluses.
