Tate Gallery Short Of Funds
 LONDON (Reuters)—The Tate Gallery, one of the world's finest art museums, complained today that its budget was large enough to meet its needs.
 Unless more money is forthcoming, the gallery may become "a collection of minor works," the gallery's trustees said in their annual report.
 Tate has only £7,500 a year to buy new works. This allows it to purchase some minor works but is "pitifully uncompetitive" when it comes to buying major art masterpieces, the trustees said.
 The trustees asked the government for a straight grant of £200,000 with which to buy new pictures and an annual grant of £40,000.
 Tate houses what probably is the finest collection of English painting and sculpture in the world. Its collection of French impressionist and post-impressionist art is renowned.
 The problem of buying new pictures has plagued the gallery ever since it was reopened in 1947 after being damaged by bombs in the war.
 The gallery was opened 40 years ago, after British sugar magnate Sir Henry Tate bequeathed a total of 65 paintings and a sum of £200,000 with which to finance the construction of a building.
