FROZEN TO DEATH.—A Peterboro, Ont., despatch of the 20th says: Daniel O'Leary, 73 years of age, who had come to town with a load of wool, left for home Friday after- noon last. Yesterday his dead, woolly, frozen solid, was found lying between two large snow drifts on a cross road in Otno- bec township. No trace of his team or sleigh were found.

CARNIVAL AT VICTORIA.—The carnival at Victoria, Crapaud, last evening, was a very successful affair. The ice was in good condition. The attendance of spectators was large, Summerside and Charlottetown being well represented, and some of the costumes were very handsome. The Artillery Band was present and rendered appropriate music during the evening.

POLICE COURT.—This forenoon Wallace Rice, charged with wife-beating, was sen- tenced to thirty days' imprisonment with hard labor. His wife testified that a few days after her confinement he caught her by the breast and tried to shove her out the door because she refused to allow her bedroom stove to be sold to get money to buy liquor. His Honor promised Rice the extreme penalty of the law when he next appears on a similar charge. A cross- dog case was dismissed, the prosecutor not appearing.

PRICE OF PORK.—The St. John Sun says: P. E. Island mess pork is 50 cents cheaper. The general trade in provisions is merely from hand to mouth, owing to uncertainty as to what turn the market may take. The feeling generally can hardly be called firm. In Montreal prices are in favor of buyers all round, and 100 lbs heavy short cut mess was offered there last week at \$16, with no takers. Dressed hogs are offered at \$5.60 to \$5.80 west and \$6 to \$6.10 in Montreal. Pork closed in Chicago on Monday at \$12.12 for spot, \$12.22 for May and \$12.25 for July delivery. This is a marked de- cline.

NEWS NOTES. The coal combine managers of New York have reduced the price of stove and chestnut coal to \$4 per ton, a cut of 25 per cent. Broken coal will be sold for \$3.60 and egg for \$3.75 per ton. The total output for February 1893, was 3,128,807 tons; but this month of this year it will not exceed 2,500,000 tons.

Special agents of the United States treasury department for New England believe they have unearthed a gigantic scheme to defraud the government. A week ago they seized a valuable unregis- tered steamer at Bangor, Me., for under- valuation. The vessel was entered at Yanceboro, Me., at \$140 by P. E. Bennett, claiming residence in Kansas. Investi- gation showed \$100 was paid for the animal in England last August.

The life insurance returns in Canada for 1893 show an increase of 18 per cent over Canadian companies, was \$176,730,849, against \$161,551,528 in 1892. The num- ber of policies in force in 1893 was 124,818, against 110,117 in 1892. These are sub- stantial increases.

The Coloniasnd India says: "In Sir Samuel Baker we have lost an English- man of a type that has done most to make us a great people, and one who would have won a name for himself even in the spacious times of great Elizabeth." Whatever Sir Samuel attempted to do, he did well. Whether he was founding an English farm and homestead among the mountains of Ceylon, ruling the Soudan for the Khedive, or tracing the sources of the Nile to Albert Nyanza, his success was complete. The great traveller and sportsman served his country admirably, and his courage and sagacity are a splen- did example to the crowd of young English- men who to-day are urged on by the same love of adventure that prompted him."

A question was recently asked by a correspondent of the Times which gives a curious glimpse into some features of the English meat market. It was stated in that paper that 1,373,723 carcasses of frozen sheep had come last year from the River Plate alone, in addition to 2,214,541 from Australia and New Zea- land. Mr. Beddington, a farmer, wanted to know what becomes of this importation. He knows London well, but cannot recall a single firm having offered to sell River Plate mutton, although ostensibly many firms deal in the New Zealand article. After some computation he reaches a con- clusion which he deems not improbable—that the River Plate mutton is usually sold as New Zealand, while the latter is sold as English mutton. He suggests compulsory branding of all foreign meat, though such a plan may seem to the butcher's profits and retard the rapid march to ruin of the English farmer.
