Italian Emigrants Leave For Canada

ROME (Reuters) — The first group of 74 Italian emigrants to Canada, chosen by an Italian Catholic trade union organization, left Rome by air for Montreal Wednesday.

They will be followed within the next three weeks by more than 800 others, all travelling to Canada by air.

All men aged between 19 and 36, they will go on a one-year contract, with the right to remain in Canada if they desire.

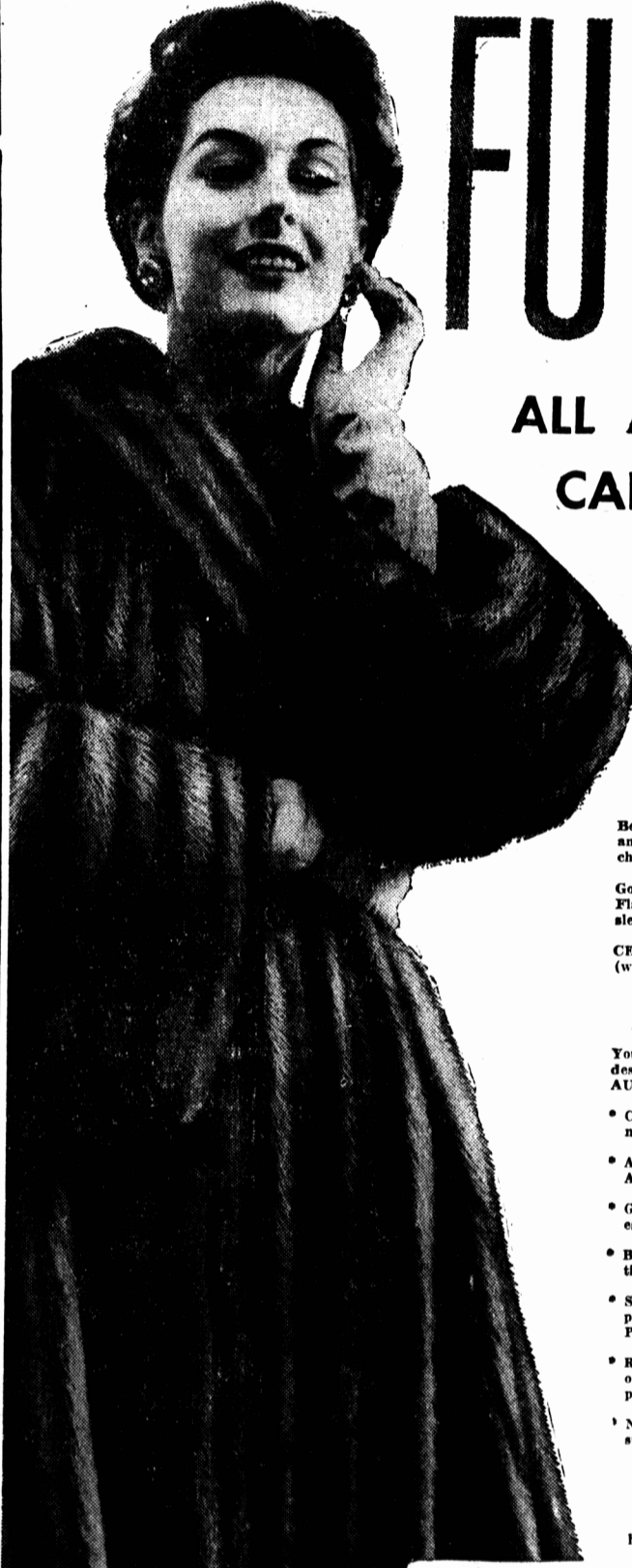
