CONTRACT BRIDGE

FAMOUS HANDS

There was little doubt in Collings' mind that the heart lead was a singleton. West's double of two hearts plus the lead of the six, apparently East's highest heart, made the situation all too clear.

To duck the heart would bring immediate defeat, since West would take his king, return a heart which East would ruff, after which the ace of diamonds would provide the setting trick.

So Collings went up with the ace of hearts and cashed the queen of spades, both opponents following suit. And then Collings made a strange play....

He led the four of spades! East was astonished to find himself the winner of a second trump trick—this time with the nine. It was an unexpected windfall. But his satisfaction was short-lived—he had to lead something back.

There was no escape for East. If he returned a club, declarer would discard three hearts and a diamond on dummy's clubs, concede the ace of diamonds, and thus make ten tricks.

If East chose instead to return a diamond, the play of the ace would end matters very quickly, while a low diamond return would be taken in dummy and three hearts would be discarded, after which a diamond back would bring the defense to the same unhappy end.

The deliberate sacrifice of a trump trick by Collings made East's position untenable.

Opening lead—nine of clubs. The setting for this remarkable hand was the regular Friday night duplicate game at the Wellesley Club in London, England. Declarer, at four spades was John Collings, playing with Harold Franklin. Both are well known British experts.

West had doubled two hearts—and meant it—and East had doubled four spades—with possibly less exuberance. West opened a club.

It was not an easy hand to play. There appeared to be enough tricks to make the contract—except for the details. Collings took the club with the queen and led the king of spades. East won the ace and returned his singleton heart.

Baron And Lady Appear In Court At Montreal

Canadian Press Staff Writer MONTREAL (CP) — Lord Shaughnessy, 36, told the municipal court Wednesday that he didn't have any money on him to pay a taxi driver after a party last month.

And he testified that his wife didn't have any cash either.

But he said he had money at home — and that's where he wanted to go when taxi driver Jean Jacques Lauzon delivered the sandy-haired baron and his attractive wife to a police station.

As a result, Lord Shaughnessy was arrested and charged with failing to pay the \$1.55 fare. His wife was also arrested and charged with failing to move on when ordered by a policeman.

UNDER ADVISEMENT Municipal court Judge Pascal Lachapelle heard evidence from the taxi driver, three police witnesses and Lord and Lady Shaughnessy, and then took the case under advisement, setting May 6 for his ruling.

He dismissed the charge against Lady Shaughnessy.

Cabbie Lauzon, a rotund man in a grey coat, told the court that Lord and Lady Shaughnessy at first couldn't agree where they wanted to go, then Lord Shaughnessy put his feet on the back of the driver's seat.

So he said he drove them to the police station and asked a constable to remove them as "undesirables."

The police suggested that Lord Shaughnessy telephone friends to pay the bill, but he declined because of the time, saying that if he could be taken home, he could pay the bill.

Finally, Lord Shaughnessy was

booked and taken to a cell. WOULDN'T LEAVE STATION Constable Auril Gaudette testified that Lady Shaughnessy wouldn't leave and insisted she wanted to stay with her husband. So she was charged, with failing to move when ordered to by a constable.

There were oblique references to their things happening in the police station, but no real mention of Lord Shaughnessy's claim that he was physically abused by the police and his wife insulted by vile language.

The couple served formal notice of action earlier this month, claiming \$20,000 in damages from the city of Montreal for the alleged mistreatment.

This action has not yet been heard in court.

Steel Firm's Profits Down

HAMILTON (CP) — The Steel Company of Canada Limited, has reported a net profit in 1958 of \$16,371,019, or \$3.79 a share, compared with \$21,156,112 or \$4.90 in 1957.

Improvement in demand for steel products last year reversed the downward trend of the closing months of 1957, the annual report said Friday. However an 86-day strike at the Hamilton works resulted in a 23-per-cent decrease in ingot production and necessitated purchase of steel to keep other company plants in operation.

The company reported an 18-per-cent decrease in consolidated sales, from \$274,849,711 in 1957 to \$225,179,255. Working capital increased by \$12,866,603 to \$103,876,527, due mainly to decline in capital spending.

The report said completion of approved capital commitments outstanding at the end of 1958 will require approximately \$32,000,000, most of which will be expended this year. During 1958 all production facilities in a \$70,000,000 expansion program, begun three years ago, came into use except a second electrolytic tinning line which will be completed this year.

The company said it is taking part in the development of the Labrador-Quebec area by participating in exploration for iron deposits.
