GEORGETOWN HOME AND SCHOOL

The monthly meeting of the Georgetown Home and School Association was held in the council chamber on Thursday April 3rd, with the president Mr. J.H. MacDonald presiding. The sum of \$10 was voted to help defray cost of music books to be used in school. It was decided that at the next meeting an auction will be held, with several of the members donating the articles to be auctioned, and no article to be sold for more than \$1.00. An invitation will be extended to the National Film Board at Charlottetown to present educational films some afternoon in the near future, to the school children. A letter presented to the meeting, asking that a definite stand be taken re alleged suggestions recently made by a member of the Government on the standard of teachers, was the subject of much discussion, but no definite stand will be taken until the next meeting. The difficulty encountered in getting pupils to do homework was thoroughly aired, and Mr. McInnis expressed the hope and determination that a curfew law be established.
