

Centennial Council Is Planning More Effort By Private Companies

OTTAWA (CP)—The Canadian Centennial Council's last annual meeting—and that's how close 1997 is—will aim squarely at getting private enterprise more involved in the centennial.

Fewer than 50 of the 500 businesses that belong to the private organization have definite plans with the "big year" hardly six months away.

At the two-day annual meeting that begins today, the council hopes to stimulate more projects by illustrating how successful they can be.

More than 450 would-be authors responded within a week this spring after Imperial Tobacco announced its centennial project, a \$33,000 prize for the best book on Canada's future.

The project, with its nine \$3,000 second prizes, has generated some 2,000 inquiries in the month since it was announced. Even some rough drafts have been submitted.

There are some sequences of bidding which, for practical purposes, are regarded as impossible—that is, you cannot have a hand that fits the bid or bids you've made. In each of the following cases, specify whether the last bid by South is possible or impossible.

NORTH

Manitoba Seeding Is Delayed By Period Of Wet Weather

OTTAWA (CP)—Wheat planting is almost complete in wide areas of Alberta and Saskatchewan, but wet weather has put Manitoba far behind, the Dominion Bureau of Statistics has reported.

The third telegraphic report of the year said rain from May 15 to May 26 delayed field work in Manitoba. Only 15 per cent of the grain crops are in the ground.

Seeding resumed in lighter Manitoba soils following the five-day rain, but the Red River Valley may not be dry enough for planting until next weekend. Percentage of crops in the ground varies from 10 to 35 in the west and averages at 10 in the east.

Wheat seeding is practically complete in western Saskatchewan; but cool, showery weather has slowed activity in eastern parts of the grain belt's principal wheat province. In the east, 35 per cent of the wheat crops are in the ground.

Seeded portions range from 60 to 75 per cent in central Saskatchewan, including Weyburn, Regina, Moose Jaw, Saskatoon and Prince Albert. All told, 65 per cent of the wheat and 40 per cent of coarse grain are in the ground. Warm dry weather is needed to complete the job in Saskatchewan.

Wheat seeding in Alberta is well advanced except for certain western areas. Crop prospects generally are good for the south and west as far north as Athabasca. In the east and northeast and to the north at Berwyn, moisture conditions are only fair.

Throughout the grain belt, moisture conditions are generally favorable. The DBS survey is based on information received Tuesday from crop correspondents, observers and grain men.

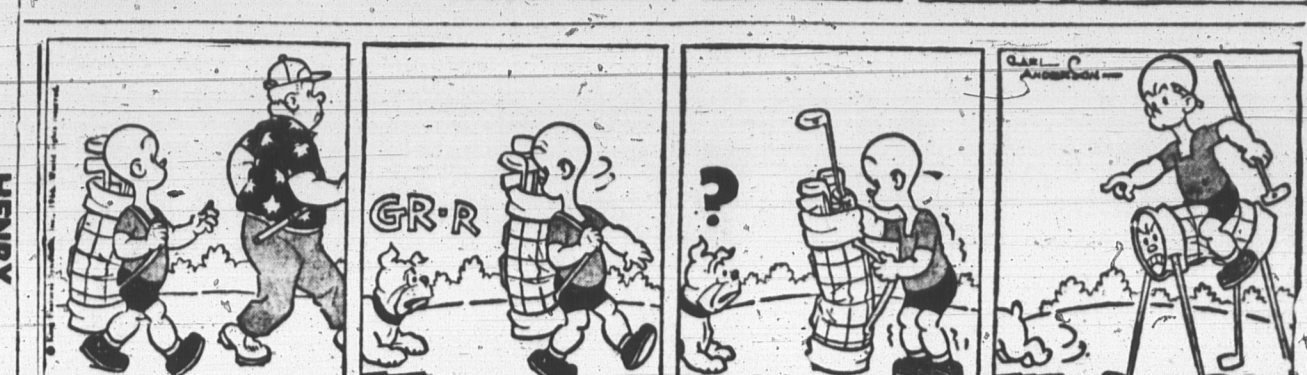
