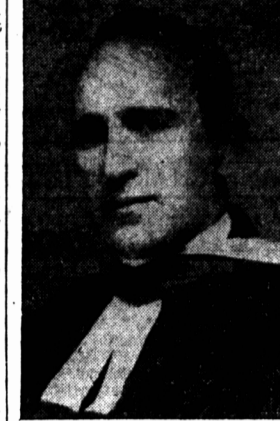

Dr. Bonnell Writes On Presbyterianism



NEW YORK, Mar 8 - The part Presbyterians played in the American Revolution was so great that it was described in the British House of Commons as "this Presbyterian rebellion," according to a statement by Dr. John Sutherland Bonnell (above) in the current issue of Look magazine.

Dr. Bonnell points out that the only clergyman who signed the Declaration of Independence, the Rev. John Witherspoon, was a Presbyterian, and that at least 13 other signers of the historic document can also be identified as Presbyterians.

He credits the Encyclopedia Britannica with the statement that "the Presbyterian exerted a great influence in the construction of the Constitution of the United States, and the government of the Church was assimilated in no slight degree to the civil government of the country."

Dr. Bonnell, minister of the Fifth Avenue Presbyterian Church in New York for more than 18 years, is known nationally through his weekly broadcast on National Vespers over the ABC network. A native of Dover, P. E. Island, before his call to the Fifth Avenue Church he was pastor of the Westminster Church in Winnipeg, and at St. Andrew's Presbyterian Church in Saint John, N. B.

In describing how the Presbyterian Church is governed, Dr. Bonnell says that the church's system of government is "itself a representative democracy." The people govern the church through elected representatives, and all property is vested in laymen - not in ministers or bishops, he explains.

Dr. Bonnell's article, "What Is A Presbyterian?" is twelfth in LOOK's series on the various religious groups of the United States.

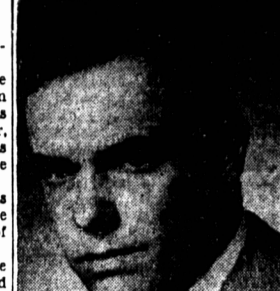
