Premier To Visit Ottawa Shortly

Several cabinet ministers expected to be out of the province during the next few weeks. Premier Walter F. Shaw, late next week, will be in Ottawa on business and will probably attend a portion of the annual meeting of the national Progressive Conservative party. Industry and Natural Resources Minister Leo Rossiter has several meetings scheduled. He will attend a national meeting in Toronto on resources development; possibly meet in Ottawa with the Maritime Transport Commission on subsidies for North Shore shipping; may meet in Montreal with representatives of companies interested in establishing food processing plants in this province; and will attend an Atlantic Provinces meeting in Halifax to discuss transportation. Agriculture Minister Andrew MacRae has an Ottawa meeting scheduled with the federal minister, Hon. Alvin Hamilton, and provincial Secretary J. David Stewart is expected to be in Toronto on business next week.

Peasants Seeking U.S. Aid Called Criminals In Russia

MOSCOW (AP) — A group of Siberian peasants who sought American help to leave the Soviet Union are described by a Soviet news agency as criminals and persons addicted to beating their children. The Soviet version of the peasants, as carried by the Novosti news agency, is in sharp contrast to the description given by U.S. embassy officials. The peasants—six men, 12 women and 24 children—were traded into the U.S. Embassy last week seeking help but were told nothing could be done for them. U.S. officials described the Siberians as healthy, good-mind people wanting to escape the hard life of Christians in the Soviet Union. After being heard in the Embassy, the group was taken by bus to a hotel and later the Soviet government said they were being shipped back to their homes in Chermogorsk. Some of the peasants shouted as they were being led out of the Embassy that they would be shot. One said the news recognizes no state authority. Novosti tells of children being hidden in underground pits as their parents sought to keep them from being taken away by Soviet officials. Novosti says the religious folk abuse their children, making mental cases of them. A launched drive was made against them in Chermogorsk. "The initial results of this public drive against the peasants are that the most malicious of the sect have been deprived of 24 parental rights, and their children now are being cared for at a boarding school. After being persuaded by local public bodies, 17 people recently broke from the sect. The leaders of the families, G. Vashchenko and A. Miller among them, were sentenced by a people's court to imprisonment. "The appeal of active members of the splinter group to a foreign embassy for help to leave the country was actually an attempt on their part to evade responsibility for their evil deeds. "We hope that the public of Chermogorsk will help these Christians regain human dignity."

B-A Oil Takeover Declared Against P.Q. Gov't Wishes

QUEBEC (CP)—Premier Lesage said Wednesday an agreement by which British American Oil Company has acquired control of Shawinigan Chemicals Limited was made against the will of the Quebec government and Hydro-Quebec. The agreement between B.A. and Shawinigan Water and Power Company—parent company of Shawinigan Chemicals—was announced Tuesday. Through it, B.A. is taking control of Shawinigan Chemicals to 66.25 of the outstanding shares from 25 per cent.

Too Late To Classify
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VoW Blasts At Norstad
OTTAWA (CP) — The Voice of Women has attacked Gen. Lauris Norstad for his statements here last week in favor of the acquisition of nuclear arms by Canada. The group said in a statement it deplored "foreign pressure being applied to force Canada into a course of action in spite of the conscience of a large section of her population." The statement, signed by VoW president Mrs. Therese Casgrain of Montreal, urged the government to declare that Canada will never join the nuclear club. U.S. Gen. Norstad, who returned last week as NATO military commander, said the Canadian government made a commitment in 1959 to equip Canadian forces in Europe with nuclear weapons. The VoW, a relatively new voluntary group with about 7,500 members, has campaigned for nuclear disarmament.

Halifax Meet To Discuss Report

The meeting of Atlantic Provinces' government representatives to discuss the report of the MacPherson Royal Commission on Transportation has been scheduled for Jan. 22 in Halifax. The meeting was called by Nova Scotia's Premier Robert Stanfield and will deal with portions of the commission's report that apply to the Atlantic area. Industry and Natural Resources Minister Leo Rossiter will represent the province of Nova Scotia. The meeting will be attended by the premiers of the Atlantic Provinces, but Premier Walter F. Shaw will be unable to attend and there is a possibility that Newfoundland's Premier Smallwood will not attend.

New Crisis For Dollar Is Forecast

VANCOUVER (CP)—Canada can expect another financial and dollar-exchange crisis "perhaps sooner than we think" if the government fails to change economic thinking, Walter Gordon, financial spokesman for the Liberal party, said here. The member of Parliament for Toronto Davenport, speaking to the Charter Accountants Club of Vancouver, said Canada's international trade balance has lost \$1,000,000,000 in each of the last two years—has "placed a heavy mortgage on our future as a separate independent nation." "We have settled these huge deficits by selling off our natural resources and our Canadian-owned companies and by going into debt. "Sooner or later we shall have to pay for it—that we can be certain." Mr. Gordon said Canada's four main economic problems are unemployment, the dangers of inflation as a result of dollar devaluation, the deficit in international trade and Canada's role in changing world trading patterns. Text of Mr. Gordon's address was released to the press in advance of delivery.
