HALIFAX, Sept. 14 (CP)—Mrs. Pearl Lockhart, 51, Halifax, injured in a high speed car crash Friday night, died in hospital today.

CHILD FATALITY—A sad fatality occurred in the home of Mr. and Mrs. Ronald MacLean, Bellevue Heights, when Mrs. MacLean found their infant son dead in his crib Saturday morning.

Mr. William Collings, Montague, employee of Clark Bros., suffered a severe back injury Saturday morning when a floor on which he had been standing collapsed into a cellar.

An experiment in paving city streets will be made almost immediately with Ambrose Street, Victoria Avenue, Pleasant Street and Highland Avenue all being covered with a cold-mix binder and a chip stone top.

At the end of the Council meeting Mayor B. Earle MacDonald asked the Councilors to remain for a few minutes to discuss plans for the receipt of the Prince of Wales and the Duke of Edinburgh.

The regulations restricting the cutting of pulpwood and pit props went into effect yesterday, making Prince Edward Island the only Province with legislation governing the cutting of timber on private farms and woodlots.

GOVERNOR ADAMS ARRIVES—Governor Sherman Adams, of New Hampshire arrived by car last night and will spend a week at a North Shore resort.

Under the new Eastern service, C. N. E. trucks will leave Charlottetown not later than 9 a. m. daily, and earlier if postal commitments allow.

After being held up for several weeks because of unfavorable weather conditions, preparations for the paving of the Commercial Road section from Whim Road to Murray River is now making good progress.

Yesterday workmen of the Department of Public Works and Highways gave the Wood Islands mill in Montague a preliminary oil bath, also considered part of the same project.

It is understood that asphalt for the cold-mix pavement will not arrive until the latter part of this week, so that actual paving operations will not begin until the first of next week.

The preliminary gravel coat has been placed all over the road a distance of some nine to ten miles. It was reported last night at the Montague Town Council meeting by His Worship Mayor B. H. Yeo, that the street paving program might have to be set aside for another year owing to the lateness of the season before the work could be done.

Mr. Benjamin Profit, a resident of Alberton for many years had the misfortune to fall from a ladder in his barn yesterday afternoon and was taken to the Western Hospital in a serious condition.

An important three-way business deal has been completed in Charlottetown which will see two large stores closing and a new one opening. The deal also means the retirement from the retail grocery trade of two well-known local operators and the entrance into the field of a newcomer.

Prince Edward Island will get a fast morning mail service by truck to all parts of the Province under an arrangement concluded yesterday between the Canadian National Railways, the Post Office Department and Provincial Transport Ltd., a subsidiary of The Guardian.

Mr. Pierce has purchased the business of Cudmore Bros. and in addition has also purchased the name and goodwill of the Cash and Carry Store.

The double ferry service on the Borden-Cape Tormentine run which was scheduled to end September 15 has been extended to Saturday September 29.

An inquest has been called for Monday afternoon in the City Police Court to inquire into the death of John Kenneth MacCallum, son of Mr. and Mrs. K. E. MacCallum, St. Peter's, who was killed in a highway accident Tuesday.

In no Province in Canada is better work being done in the fight against cancer than in Prince Edward where the message delivered by the Hon. Dr. W. J. P. MacMillan, O.B.E. at the annual campaign dinner held last night in Trinity United Church Hall.

Dr. MacMillan stressed the value of the educational program being carried on among the people through the efforts of the Executive Secretary, J. P. MacInnis and stated that this fact was reflected in the many cases coming to the attention of doctors in the early stages of the disease.
