

### Russian Arms Go To Yemen Near The Aden Protectorate

LONDON (Reuters) — Russia has been sending arms, planes and instructors to the Arab Red Sea kingdom of Yemen, the foreign office said Friday.

Britain is particularly interested in arms shipments to the area because of the sporadic fighting for the last two years along the ill-defined borders of Yemen and its British guarded neighbor, the Aden protectorate.

The Aden protectorate borders the state of Oman, where British troops and planes are backing forces of the sultan of Muscat and Oman in a fight against rival tribes supporting the Imam of Oman.

Russia, besides its sale of arms to Yemen, has sold three submarines to Egypt. It also has shipped arms to Syria.

The United States has sold planes and guns to Yemen's neighbor, Saudi Arabia.

The foreign office spokesman told a press conference there have been six, possibly seven, shipments of Russian arms to the Yemen.

#### BEGINNING OF YEAR

"I think the supply started about the beginning of the year," he said.

The shipments had included a number of "fairly old fashioned

piston driven" aircraft.

The spokesman said he thought there are probably about 50 Soviet instructors in the Yemen.

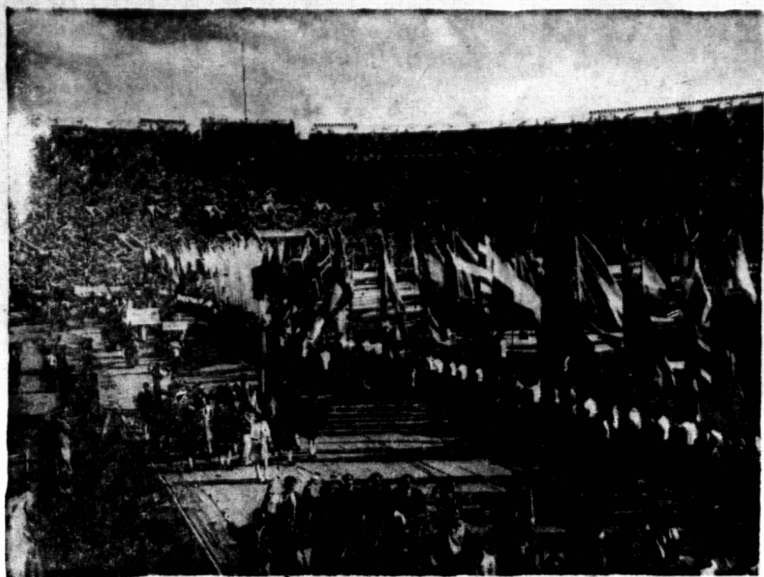
The Cairo newspaper Al Ahram Friday reported a shipment of Russian arms purchased by Yemen was unloaded recently at the Yemeni port of El Salif.

A communique issued Thursday in Aden accused Yemeni troops of occupying illegal positions in protectorate territory. It said the troops were attacked Monday by British planes.

The spokesman said Friday Britain is "naturally anxious" to do whatever it can in co-operation with the Yemen government to win peace along the protectorate-Yemen border. Britain had been in contact with Yemen for some months for that purpose.

#### SHIPS COLLIDE

ANTWERP, Belgium (Reuters) — The Holland-American liner Diemerdijk, returning from San Francisco, was in a collision in the Scheldt Estuary early Saturday with a British coaster. The Dutch liner went aground but was refloated with the aid of tugs without serious damage. The coaster returned to harbor for repairs to a hole "several feet wide."

Opening lead—ace of diamonds. This hand was played in the Vanderbilt Cup team of four championship play back in 1930. The bidding was quite remarkable and should be interpreted within the framework of the bidding methods then in use.

North was Harold S. Vanderbilt, founder of Contract Bridge, and South was Ralph J. Leibendefter. They were playing the Vanderbilt Club system. An opening club bid showed a strong hand containing at least three and a half honor tricks. The club bid was forcing for one round and, being an artificial bid, did not guarantee club length.

West's two club bid merely showed a club suit. Vanderbilt passed. He had been relieved of the obligation to respond by West's overcall.

East was Mrs. Dorothy Sims, who was a pioneer in the field of psychic bidding. She lived up to her reputation by bidding two hearts. Mrs. Sims knew South had a big hand and hoped to confuse the issue by bidding a suit she feared the opponents had.

Leibendefter didn't like the developments that were taking place and thought he was being jobbed, but temporized by making a cue bid of three clubs, West's suit.

West, with good heart support, bid three hearts. Vanderbilt, having previously passed and thus limited his hand, now bid four hearts. This was clearly a cue bid also, since if he had had hearts he would have doubled three hearts. Vanderbilt was asking South to choose between spades and diamonds as the trump suit.

Leibendefter correctly interpreted North's bidding as a hand poor in high cards but containing distributional features. He bid four spades and made five.

Contract Bridge was barely five years old at the time, but, as can be seen, inferential bidding sequences had already been developed. The odd part of the hand is that everybody at the table bid hearts—except Leibendefter.

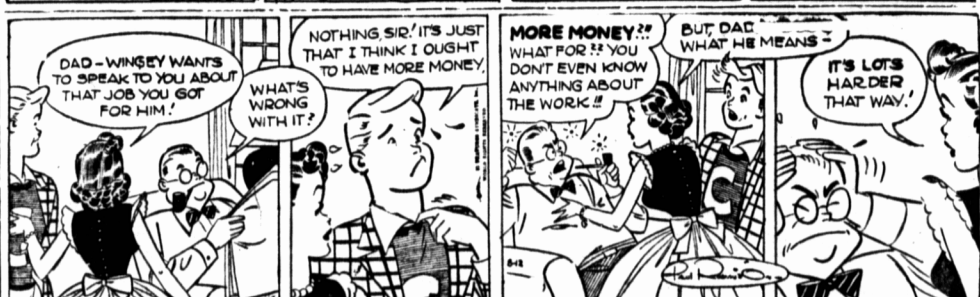
