Children Alone In House Seen Asking For Trouble

NEW YORK (AP)—In some cases, the parents had been gone only a few minutes—others, for hours. Authorities step into some cases and press criminal charges, claiming the mother or father deserted the children in a tavern or to attend a party. Some of these parents are imprisoned on conviction. The problem became so acute in New York City that the fire department last year launched a door-to-door program of inspection and education. Despite that, eight children perished in recent weeks in home fires while adults were absent. "The very first day the firemen began to visit the homes," the spokesman said, "they found 30 or 35 cases of children alone in houses. Nobody was around except the youngsters."

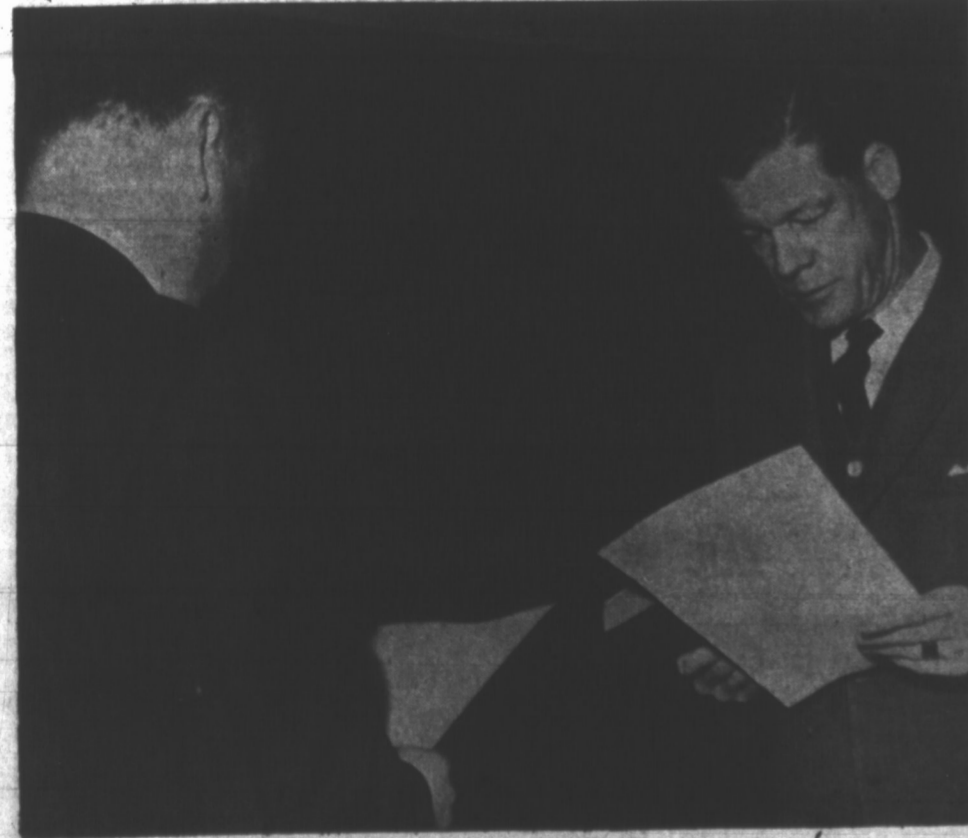
U.S. POTATO DROP

There were 19,000,000 hundred-weight less fall potatoes on Jan. 25th in the United States this year than for the same date in 1964. The holdings by growers and dealers amounted to 97,975,000 hundredweight of fall potatoes in 26 states where fall potatoes are grown this year compared to 116,375,000 last year.

Trial By Magistrate Is Choice By Woman

SOURIS — Hilda Pauline Longhues of Little Harbor, pleaded guilty to theft of an automobile and elected trial by magistrate in Kings County Magistrate's Court yesterday before Magistrate James B. Johnston, QC. She was remanded in custody to Feb. 10 in Georgetown. Representing the Crown in all cases was J. A. McGuigan, QC. Alvin Douglas Blue, 3111 River, was fined \$25 and costs for possession of liquor not purchased from a vendor. Charged with impaired driving, Harold Lloyd Stewart, East Baltic, who previously pleaded not guilty to the charge, had his case adjourned to March 3. His counsel is John P. Nicholson. Also represented by Mr. McGuigan was Frederick William MacEwen, Morell, who pleaded not guilty to driving while his license was suspended. Testify for the Crown were Walter MacAdam, Morell, and Sgt. James Dunn of the RCMP. The defendant testified on his own behalf, and the case was further adjourned to Feb. 17. John Charles Martell, Georgetown, pleaded not guilty to threatening and had his case adjourned to Feb. 10. He was represented by M. J. McQuaid. Also on the docket were eight cases of illegal possession of liquor and four of intoxication.

Major Businesses Planning Capital Investment Boost

OTTAWA (CP) — Canada's major business leaders have planned a 50-per-cent increase in capital investment by 1966 over 1963 levels and indicate this may well continue to the end of the decade. This information was gathered in a special survey of key developing industries, conducted for the Economic Council of Canada. The survey differs from the annual outlook of private and public investment and its mid-year review, prepared by the trade department and the bureau of statistics, in that the special survey covers only some companies in key industries and looks to the longer-range future. Chosen for the survey were those companies considered likely to be making the largest capital expenditures in new plant and equipment between 1965 and 1970. Utilities were given first attention since they are the highest-spending group and by the nature of their business, have to make long-range plans. Most of the other firms surveyed were ones which appeared to be entering major development phases—pulp and paper, chemical, steel, automotive, petroleum, and mining.

Car Production Down This Week

TORONTO (CP) — Scheduled production of cars and trucks in Canada this week is 15,367 units compared with 17,646 units which rolled off the lines last week, the Motor Vehicle Manufacturers' Association says. Reason for the drop is the strike at Chrysler Canada Ltd. plants. Last week production at Chrysler totalled 984 units. Scheduled production at General Motors is 8,995 units against 10,574 produced in the week ended Jan. 30. Ford production will climb to 4,792 from 4,197. Production of all companies to date is 63,238 units against 73,584 units produced at the same time last year. Scheduled car production by company this week and total production to Jan. 30, with comparative figures for last week and 1964 in brackets: America's Motors — 800 (814); 3,553 (3,493); Chrysler — (701); 7,872 (8,532); Ford 4,043 (3,498); 5,532 (6,763); General Motors 7,995 (9,256); 34,794 (33,996); Studebaker 480 (380); 1,538 (576); Volvo 55 (50); 200 (197).
