Strange But True

It is the natural desire for young men and women to get married and have homes of their own. But it is a misfortune that so many boys and girls have such thoughts too. Perhaps it has never been defined at what age a boy thinks of having a girl friend, nor how early a girl thinks of having a boy friend.

A girl 14 married to a boy not much older cannot possibly understand the duties of domestic life. The boy husband misses the well-conducted and orderly home presided over by his experienced mother. For a few months they may live in what they consider is true love, or what they may call love which has brought them together; and then they discover what a mistake they have made, though incapable of analyzing it.

There is indeed, throughout the several classes of which society is composed, too little thought of needful preparation for marriage; and it might be a good thing if clergy were to be empowered to discuss marriage as were found incapable of explaining its responsibilities. True, there are girls of fifteen or sixteen as well as capable as some women twice their age, but a majority only imagine their superiority to the foolish matrimony, later to be discouraged and unhappy.

There would be less poverty, less suffering, less family discord, and less infidelity if more thoughtful supervision was exercised, and more kindly advice given to girls and boys just trying their first wings in the game of love, than is indicated in the boy and girl marriages referred to. It is not among the working classes alone such instruction is wanting. In all classes there are young fry who rush into marriage without giving any serious thought to the future. How can such marriages weather the storms of domestic difficulties and dangers?

Girls are mere play things, and boys too, for that matter, when they are small, pretty and amusing. Pelted and spoiled with too much attention, they frequently grow up in a world of dreams. In wealthy homes they often live in what one might call an artificial paradise. Animated dolls fall fatally in estimation as soon as the extent of their capabilities is discovered.

What does a boy of 16 know about angling for a wife? What does a girl of 14 know about angling for a husband? When the thing they most desire is caught they don't know what to do with it.

Quite frequently early marriages produce early neglect. I have seen this very condition arise among some of my school mates. There are examples in every community, and the exceptions but prove the rule. The girl wife and the boy husband grow tired of each other. They had not acquired a knowledge of the delights of constancy. They had been careless before they put on the matrimonial yoke, and now sigh for a return of the old life. Then they step across the threshold and try to outdo the unmarried girls by a display of independence. But the glory of that soon passes away and misfortunes of a neglected home result. The bride of a summer makes no provisions for other companions, and the home being more or less neglected he seeks the bright lights to offset the dullness at home. If there are children then they too must suffer as a result of such domestic ills.

Soon there is not enough money coming in to supply the necessities of life. Here's where the tale of poverty and its attendant miseries begins. The premature woman, on the other hand, becomes acquainted with the up and downs of life in time to avoid many of the pitfalls the young girl falls into.

One frequently hears a good deal of chatter about "puppy love", but is it too serious a matter to be laughed off. Left by themselves to work into matrimony, it is little wonder so many boy and girl marriages end up in failure.

Government Must Decide On Indo-China Action Without Consulting Parliament

OTTAWA, (CP)—The government faces a decision on probably its most important peace-time international responsibility without an opportunity to consult Parliament.

The request from the Geneva conference that Canada act with Poland and India on a commission to supervise the Indo-China armistice found Parliament in recess until late autumn and most of the cabinet ministers absent from Ottawa.

It is believed here that there would be few if any members of Parliament who would oppose Canada's acceptance of this delicate and expensive responsibility.

But there is every likelihood of criticism if the government takes on a hopeless task in the Far East. That would party explain why the reaction of the government was to wait for complete details of what the supervisory task would involve before making any decision.

There would also be criticism in some quarters if participation by Canada in the Geneva conference decisions involved this country in any conflict with the United States.
