DECLARES WAR TEHRAN, Iran (AP) - An Iranian provincial governor declared war Wednesday on southern tribesmen resisting the shah's sweeping land reform program. He said they would be bombed or hanged in 24 hours. Gen. Karim Vazirani, governor of Fars province in southwestern Iran, said the bombardment would be carried out today by the Iranian Air Force. He confirmed that rebellious Ghahshuhar tribesmen had killed officers and gendarmes in raids on police posts. There are about 200,000 Ghahshuhars who are chiefly cattle breeders.
