

**OBITUARY**

**ROBERT TWEEDY BARLOW**

A wide circle of friends and relatives were deeply saddened to learn of the passing of Robert Tweedy Barlow of Bradalbane in the Prince County Hospital Annex on January 26, 1967 in his 90th year.

The late Mr. Barlow was born in Wellington on Feb. 22, 1877, the son of the late George and Hannah (Taylor) Barlow. In 1892 he married Mary Elizabeth MacKenzie of Victoria West and settled in Wellington where he was a prosperous farmer until he retired in 1940 then moved to Bradalbane where he resided until October 6th when he entered the Prince County Hospital and passed peacefully away on the above mentioned date.

He was a member of the United Church and a regular attendance as long as health permitted.

He leaves to mourn their loss two sons Ira of Westwood, Mass., Donald of Bradalbane and two daughters Marnie, (Mrs. Norman Matheson), Bradalbane and Flora (Mrs. Harold Clay), Charlottetown. His wife and two children predeceased him. He is survived by three sisters, Mrs. Armine Ashcroft and Mrs. Winifred Durost of Manchester, N.H. and Mrs. Fred McAusland, Wellington, also thirteen grandchildren and sixteen great-grandchildren.

The funeral was held from Bradalbane United Church on Monday at 2 p.m. The service at the Church and grave was conducted by his pastor, Rev. D. S. MacLeod assisted by Rev. George Killen. Hymns sung were "The Lord's My Shepherd" and "Abide With Me."

Funeral arrangements were under the direction of Joseph L. Davison, Kensington.

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**ARCHIBALD MacDONALD**  
On January 14th, 1967, the angel of death entered the Prince County Hospital, and called one of Baltic's oldest citizens in the person of Archibald MacDonald in his eighty-seventh year.

Mr. MacDonald was one of the oldest fishermen sailing out of the port of Malpeque. Mr. MacDonald fished up to within a month of his death. It was a customary scene to see Mr. MacDonald fishing oysters in Darnley Basin in late summer and early fall.

Mr. MacDonald was born in Summerside, where he received his education. He spent his leisure hours reading, and could converse on any subject.

He was the son of Archibald MacDonald and Christy Rattray of Summerside. He had six brothers and two sisters of which one brother Wilfred, is living and residing in Moncton, N.B.; one sister, Elizabeth, residing in Calgary, Alberta. His other brothers and sister predeceased him. His brother Wilfred was able to attend his funeral.

About a half century ago Mr. MacDonald married Loretta Champion, daughter of the late Mr. and Mrs. Thomas Champion of Baltic, Lot 18. Mr. MacDonald, purchased a place in Baltic and resided there during his life. To this union he had a family of seven daughters and three sons: (Irene) Mrs. Ansel Champion, residing in Charlottetown; (Lulu) Mrs. Bernice Hynes, residing in Fountain Road; Gladys, at home; Emma, Mrs. Vernon Champion, residing in St. John, N.B., who was home for her father's funeral; (Ruth) Mrs. Elton MacKay who predeceased him about twelve years ago; (Clara) Mrs. Kentford Abbott, Windsor, Ont.; (Evelyn) Mrs. Everett MacDonald, Shamrock; Charles MacDonald, residing at Darnley; John MacDonald, residing in Calgary, Alberta; Archie MacDonald, Jr., at home; Nancy, a granddaughter resided with him at his home.

He was buried Tuesday afternoon January 16, from the Keir Memorial Presbyterian Church where his pastor Rev. E.H. Bean preached a very impressive sermon. Hymns sung were, "The Lord's My Shepherd", and "Abide With Me".

Flower bearers were three grandsons, Edward Champion, Gordon Champion, Clare Hynes. There were seven lovely floral tributes.

Funeral arrangements were under the guiding hand of J.L. Davison. He sailed many times over angry seas, but his voyage to the other shore.

The King's boys and girls took both basketball games. The girls won 34-21 and the boys conquer-

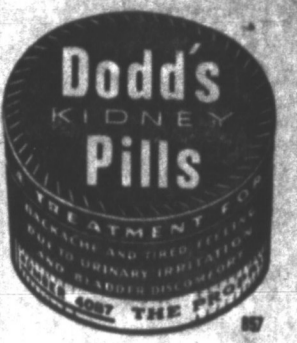
ed 55-30. In the latter contest, Winston Smith was tops for the locals with an even dozen points.
