TRADES PROCEEDINGS.—The meeting of tradesmen and others held in the City Council Chamber last night to make arrangements for a trades procession on the occasion of the celebration of the Diamond Jubilee of Her Majesty the Queen, was fairly well attended. The beer, which he believed to be of an intoxicating character, was the worst he ever drank and no man who had any respect for his defendant, then went on the stand and swore he had the place rented to a man whose name he did not know. The man was called "Tommy" by the witness' mother, and "Young Fellow" by the witness.

JUDGE REDDIN'S LECTURE.

There was a good audience assembled last night in St. Patrick's Hall, to hear Judge Reddin lecture on the "Deportation of the Acadians." Professor Gaven occupied the chair and introduced the lecturer.

The first Acadian question is one eminently fascinating to the legal mind. The doings of the English Government in the different stages of the controversy, the oath of allegiance ever-varying in form but almost always formed to entrap, constitute a tangled skein, in the unraveling of which Judge Reddin showed himself to be engaged in work he loved. On this branch of his subject the lecturer indulged his professional tastes too freely perhaps, to allow him to give his hearers a full description of the harrowing scenes which took place when Governor Lawrence took things in his own hands, and perpetrated that cruel deed which will stick to his name for ever. Judge Reddin gave an abbreviated account of this part of his theme, and promised to give his written account of the closing scene of Acadian wrongs on some future occasion.

Miss Kelly, at the close of the lecture, read the first stanza in response to a telegram from Rev. Dr. Morrison proposed, and Mr. James Byrne seconded a vote of thanks to which the lecturer briefly responded.
