Children's Pets Savagely Destroyed At St. Eleanors

An act of vandalism occurred on the property of Willard Durant, in St. Eleanors district, about one-half mile west of Summerside, sometime late Thursday night or early Friday morning. Two rabbit hutchers in his back yard were broken into and the rabbits savagely killed with a pitch fork taken from his garden.

The rabbits were the property of some Summerside children and were being cared for and raised on Mr. Durant's property, and were confined to the two rabbit hutchers at all times.

Mr. Durant was emphatic in his belief that no one from his neighbourhood had any knowledge of who had committed the destruction, and was also unable to suggest a motive for cruelty and savagery of the attack on the rabbits in which the wooden hutchers were torn from the unlocked hutchers.
