Tignish Credit Union Gains \$51,000

The annual meeting of the Tignish Credit Union Ltd. was held in the St. Mary's hall on Nov. 10; the president, John M. Handrahan, presided.

Mr. Richard Hennessey, inspector of credit unions for P.E.I., read and explained the annual financial report; this report showed that total assets now amount to \$234,784.91 which is a gain of nearly one thousand dollars per week for the past years business. Loans outstanding at the end of the year totalled \$204,117.76 while shares and deposits amount to \$22,546.50. There were 1006 members at the end of the year.

The report of the board of directors was read by the secretary, Emile J. Gallant, while the credit committee report was given by Roy Clohosey and Patrick E. Hogan read the report of the supervisory committee.

Guest speakers were Rev. Wm. Simpson, director of the extension department of St. Dunstan's University, and Richard Hennessey, inspector of credit unions for P.E.I. Father Simpson, who has spent some time as curate in Tignish parish, and is assured of an attentive audience any time he speaks in Tignish, told how the Farmers Bank of Rustico, while not strictly speaking a credit union, was the example that inspired Desjardin in his struggle to provide a source of credit and a means of regular saving for the common people.

Father Simpson also urged the members to increase their savings and thus build up their credit union until they can be sure of taking care of the credit needs of the community.

Mr. Hennessey spoke on different phases of the credit union movement and stressed the insurance services provided, at no cost to the individual by share and loan insurance.

Rev. John A. MacDonald, P.P., urged everyone to join the credit union as a means of developing the habit of regular saving and thereby providing a source of credit when the need arises.

Rev. Dennis Gallant urged the parents to have more and more of their children become members and thus make an early start in acquiring the habit of thrift which is so sorely needed in the younger members of the society. He also condemned the practice of many parents who give their children the family allowance cheques to squander as they wish.

Other speakers were Gerald Handrahan, manager of the Tignish Co-operative Association Ltd., who was the first treasurer of the credit union; Wilson Shea, manager of Tignish Fisheries; and Ray Handrahan and Gregory McInnis, past presidents of the credit union.

Mrs. Max McInnis, Mrs. Alfred Gillis and Herman Gillis were elected to the board of directors, while Terrence Gavin and Fidele J. Arsenault were elected to the credit and supervisory committees.
