ment as a member of the Salt Fish Board takes place at a time when he is on the fishing grounds with his schooner. As a member of the board, Captain Deal will represent the deep sea fishermen who are engaged in such large measure in the salt fish trade. Burke McInerney, a native of New Brunswick, is secretary-treasurer of the United Maritime Fishermen, an organization of the commercial fishermen of the Maritime Provinces and the Magdalen Islands. Prior to taking this position several years ago, Mr. McInerney has been associated with private business in New Brunswick. As secretary-treasurer of the United Maritime Fishermen, he is chief executive officer of the association, with headquarters at Halifax. He has been active and successful in assisting in the development of co-operative buying, processing and marketing by a number of "locals" or branches of the association. Mr. McInerney's appointment gives representation on the board to the inshore fishermen and co-operative groups.

er said, and pointed out education was one of the essential functions of the Society for Cancer Control. In reply to a question the speaker said total deaths in this Province in 1938 (last year for which figures were available) were 1024. Out of that number 110, (56 males and 54 females), were caused by cancer.

Others who spoke briefly following Dr. Ross included Lt. Col. G. Thompson, Rev. W. J. Phillips and Mrs. Frank Murray. One woman in Charlottetown that she knew of had already benefited by the literature sent to members of the society, Mrs. Murray declared. Reports presented at the meeting included one from Dr. MacMillan, a short verbal one for the board of directors, which he explained were only appointed last April and consequently had had little opportunity to do anything necessitating a lengthy report; one from secretary H. CHUNGKING, China, July 12.—Foreign Minister Wang Chung-Hui predicted today that China's continued resistance would compel Japan to seek peace at an international conference at which Great Britain and the United States would play an important role.

Wang, in an interview, said Japan had insisted on excluding neutral powers from any settlement on the two-year-old war in China but he expressed confidence that eventually Japan would have to accept China's ideas of a peace conference.

The Chinese Government, the Foreign Minister said, feels strongly that no settlement could be lasting which failed to consider the views of the United States, Britain and other powers which have large interests in China and desire to maintain the "open door" for trade there.
