**Impaired Driving Costs \$65 Fine**

A West Royalty man appeared before Magistrate Gilbert A. Gaudet in County Magistrate's Court yesterday on a charge of driving while intoxicated but pleaded guilty to a lesser charge of operating a motor vehicle while impaired. He was fined \$65 and costs or 30 days.

Another similar charge, that of having the care and control of a motor vehicle while intoxicated, against a Mount Stewart man, drew a one week remand. Two cases arising out of the Temperance Act and concerned with the illegal manufacture of spirits were also heard.

A resident of Grand Tracadie, arrested on May 28 and charged with having in his possession equipment used in the manufacture of wash, had his case further adjourned until July 25.

Defence counsel, Allison Gillis, asked for the adjournment in order that Magistrate Gaudet could check certain statements made by the witness, Constable Myles Foster of the R. C. M. P. Liquor Detachment.

A Pleasant Grove man appearing on a charge of having illegal possession of a still used in the manufacture of intoxicating spirits had his case adjourned to July 30. Evidence for the prosecution having been completed, the accused took the stand as the first witness for the defence.

Fines of \$20 and costs, or 30 days were meted out to a Pleasant Grove man and to a resident of Elm Avenue when they pleaded guilty to having illegal possession of liquor.

The remainder of the docket dealt with charges arising out of the traffic violations.

A Charlottetown man charged with speeding at Hazelgrove pleaded not guilty and had his case adjourned to July 30.

Also charged with speeding a resident of Parkdale and a resident of Vernon River were fined \$10 and costs or 10 days. A Bedford resident was fined \$10 and costs or 10 days when he pleaded guilty to a charge of operating a vehicle without a driver's license.

Statistics released recently in Ottawa indicate a decline in the incidence of polio throughout Canada in 1958 in comparison with previous years.

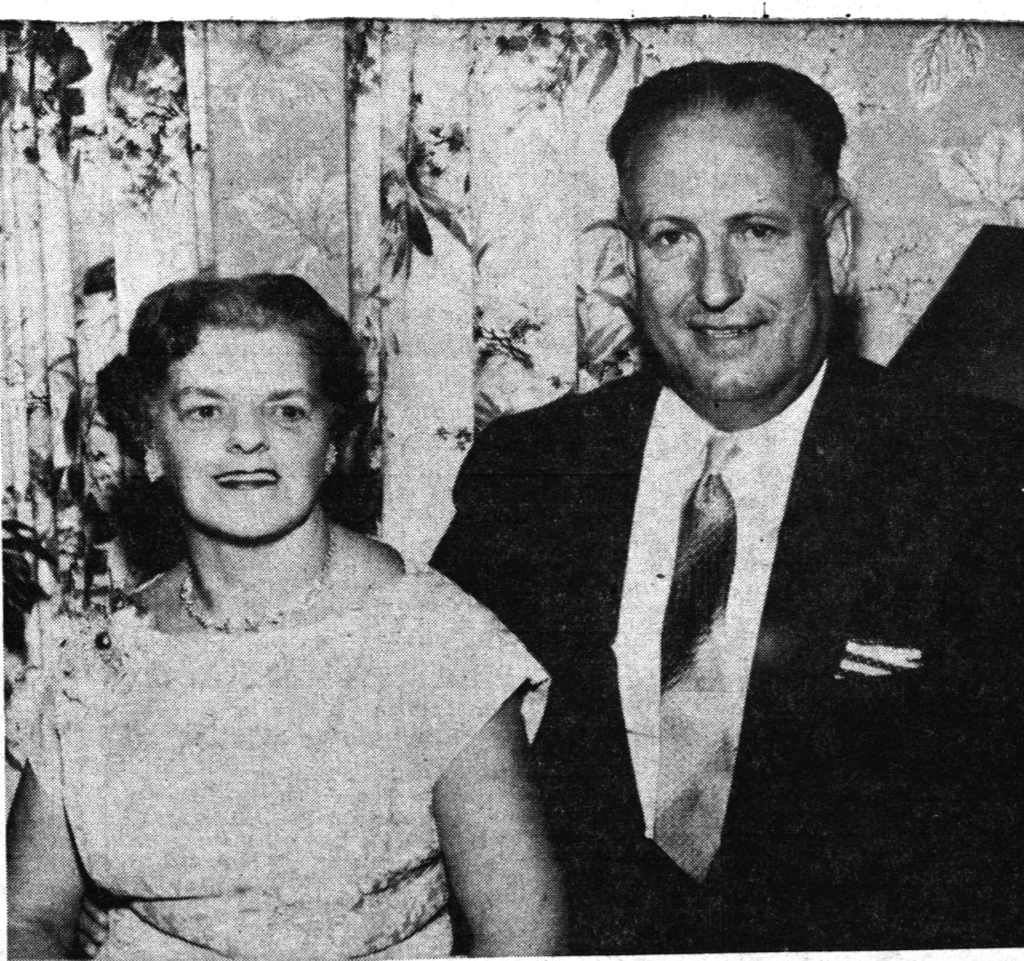

**Special Speaker At The Citadel**

**GENERAL FOODS KITCHENS**

A friend of mine said "If you can make jelly from one kind of fruit, then jelly made from two kinds of fruit will be twice as good!" Well, that's certainly true of the following recipe:

**CURRENT AND RASPBERRY JELLY**  
1/2 cups juice (about 1 quart fully ripe red currants and 1 1/2 quarts ripe red raspberries)  
7 cups (3 lbs.) sugar  
1/2 bottle Certo fruit pectin

First, prepare the juice. Crush 1 quart fully ripe red currants. Add 1 cup water and bring to a boil. Crush about 1 1/2 quarts fully ripe red raspberries. Place fruits in jelly bag and squeeze out juice. Measure 4 1/2 cups into very large saucepan.

Now make the jelly. Add sugar to juice in saucepan. Mix well. Place over high heat. Bring to a boil, stirring constantly. Stir in Certo at once. Bring to a full rolling boil. Boil hard 1 minute, stirring constantly. Remove from heat, skim off foam with metal spoon. Pour quickly into glasses. Cover at once with 1/8 inch hot paraffin. Makes about 11 medium glasses.
