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Let's Talk It Over

A Prince County Viewpoint by "d"

How very little time it takes for a novelty to become a commonplace! There are many still alive who remember the sensation caused by the passing of an automobile. School children left their seats and sprang to the windows; housewives left their cooking; boys and girls dropped their playthings and gazed open-mouthed at the new wonder. The first aeroplanes had the same effect. Recently the whining whistle of a pair of vampire jets streaking across the sky over Summerside caused a mild stir, but we get more and more blasé as time marches on. We are living in an age when an event must indeed be super-sensational to rouse us out of our indifference. "So what?" will be the slogan of the 1960's.

The fact that large firms such as R. T. Holman, Ltd. are taking an increasing interest in the education and stimulation of our youth (exemplified by Holman's recent Father's Day essay competition) is typical of an era which is becoming more conscious of the importance of grooming our boys and girls for the different world of tomorrow. "The child is father of the man," Wordsworth said. Then the boy must be carefully trained if the man is to meet successfully the challenging problems of the future. The atom bomb may save us from an early Russian attack; it can never save our civilization. Indeed, it may some day obliterate it. Enlightened education is our one and only salvation.

The more or less unexpected Conservative victories in the recent Canadian by-elections will no doubt be attributed to different reasons in different areas of Canada. The West will say that Ottawa's wheat-marketing policy was the deciding factor, the Queens County decision may be charged up to dissatisfaction with freight rates and Ontario will have another cause for the upsets. We think that inflation which holds Canada in its throttling grip, and the fact that the Dominion Government refuses to do anything really effective about it is the real reason for the Conservative gains.

Studies of family expenditures have shown that when the cost of food goes up, poor people consume less of the "protective" foods, such as milk, meat, vegetables and fruit, and the result is disastrous to the health of those people, particularly of the children. They can't do anything about their heads. So to balance their precarious budgets they cut down on foods vitally necessary to their health. It is to be devoutly hoped that these by-elections will prove an adequate warning and that something constructive will be done by our government about inflation.

New Room For Alberton School

The annual meeting of the Alberton High School rate payers was held last night in the school with an attendance of thirty. J. W. Don Campbell, M.L.A. was chairman. One of the most important decisions of the meeting was to vote funds to open a fifth room in the school and the sum of \$700.00 was voted for seats, redecorating, etc. The supplement for principal was also raised from \$475.00 to \$600.00 and the supplement for the other rooms was raised from \$250.00 to \$350.00. Mr. Emmett McCue was nominated as trustee to succeed Mr. Russell Bonyman, who has completed a year as trustee. After the reading of the minutes of the meeting and applications from five teachers for positions for the next school term, the meeting closed.

Member of F.A.O. Staff Visits Summerside

Miss Margaret Hockin, Ph.D., who until recently has been a member of the technical staff of the Food and Agricultural Organization of the United Nations, has been spending a vacation at Harbour View Cabins, and leaves the Province this morning. Dr. Hockin is a native of Truro, N. S., and attended Mount Allison and Cornell Universities. Most of her work during the past two years with the F.A.O. has been in under-developed countries, first in the Caribbean and later in the Near East and Europe.

After visiting Egypt, Lebanon and Syria last summer she went to Europe where she visited many countries including Yugoslavia, where she spent two weeks. She said that this country has come a long way in physical re-construction since it suffered great devastation during the war. Yugoslavia is the only Communist country which is a member of the specialized agencies of the U. N. Dr. Hockin said that her work has been with rural women and their organizations; she said that she found that these voluntary organizations are supplementing the work of the governments of the different countries, and are an essential factor in the economic and social structure of practically all countries. This is also true in Canada, she stated, where the Women's Institutes play an important part; she pointed out that this organization is affiliated with an international group, The Associated Countrywomen of the World. During her stay in Summerside Dr. Hockin was working on a special assignment but she did not disclose what it was.
