Acadian Teachers 61st Convention Held At Tignish

The Acadian Teachers held their 61st annual convention at Tignish, August 27 and 28. Solemn High Mass was celebrated by Rev. Joseph LeClair assisted by Rev. N. Poirier as deacon and Rev. Emanuel Richard as sub-deacon. The sermon was delivered by Rev. Charles Gallant.

The first session, held in the Parish Hall, was presided over by Mr. F. A. Arsenault. Miss Clothilda Arsenault acted as secretary. After the president's annual report, the minutes of the last annual convention held in Rustico in 1952 were read.

Remarks were passed by the pastor Rev. J. A. MacDonald, Rev. Father Morin of Fall River, Mass. Rev. John Boute and Rev. Denis Gallant.

At the afternoon session, 30 teachers resided. An interesting demonstration in physical culture was given by the pupils of the Dalton School under direction of Rev. Sister St. Raymond, an inspiring address was read by Rev. Sr. Marie Eugenia, B.A. on vocational guidance. Mr. Benoit Desroches opened the discussion of this paper.

The next paper read by Mr. Edmund Arsenault, B.Sc. was on school libraries. The discussion was opened by Mr. Aubin Gallant, B.A. The report of the education committee was given by Mr. Elmer Pineau M.A. The evening session which was largely attended began with a tambourine drill by the pupils of Tignish Convent followed by two violin selections by convent boys, under the direction of the music teacher Rev. Sister St. Antoine.

The first guest speaker was Mr. Finn of Moncton who spoke on the importance of French culture. The second guest speaker was Rev. Father Morin who chose as his topic the importance of the French language.

Addresses were also given by Rev. Charles Gallant, Rev. Michael Rooney, and also by Dr. J. H. Blanchard who gave an account of the French convention in St. Boniface, Man.

On Friday morning a requiem mass was celebrated for the deceased members of the association. The last session began with an address by the Acadian school inspector Mr. F. E. Dolrion, B.A. The last paper was read by Mr. Albert Gallant, B.A. on the advisability of opening a central office for the different Acadian societies. The discussion was opened by Rev. Joseph Doucette. This was followed by a question box, the report of committees and the election of officers for the coming year.

Death Yesterday Of Mrs. William Yeo

The death of Mrs. William L. Yeo of Harmony occurred in the Stewart Memorial Hospital, Tynne Valley on August 29, 1953 following a brief illness. She was 78 years of age on August 5. Born at Harmony, where she resided throughout her life, she was predeceased by her husband in February 1942.

Although not a trained nurse, her natural aptitude and kindly disposition found her a willing and efficient attendant on the sick throughout the district for a great many years.

Services at Victoria West Presbyterian Church was conducted by Rev. Mr. Williamson assisted by Rev. Mr. Waldron of the United Church and Rev. Mr. Osborne, retired Congregational Minister. An address by Rev. Mr. Williamson in the presence of a congregation which filled the church to overflowing testified to the Christian character of the deceased and the high esteem in which she was held by neighbours throughout the district.

Fear Argentina May Undermine Wheat Price

LONDON (Reuters) - Argentina, perhaps accompanied by Russia, may undermine the present structure of world wheat export prices which rests precariously on the International Wheat Agreement, United States farm supports and other North American policies.

It was Argentina which regularly wrecked pre-war North American efforts for export wheat price stabilization. She never undermined or undercut the 1949 International Wheat Agreement which expired last month, but conditions have changed.

She is already underselling the new international agreement. Russia, too, is willing to do so if she can find buyers. All previous commodity stabilization plans were eventually wrecked by the outsiders. Participants who thought they were holding up prices for themselves found in the end that they had been merely holding the umbrella for their outside competitors, while they themselves were caught out in the rain.

Recent Price Troubles
Examples in recent history include the pre-war rubber and coffee stabilization projects, and the 1923 international wheat plan which was wrecked when Argentina exceeded her export quota.

Some people thought that the 1949 wheat agreement would go the same way. Abstainers from the present agreement included one of the four major wheat exporting countries, Argentina, and all the minor exporting countries except France.

It did not happen to the 1948 wheat agreement. Neither Argentina nor any other country ever undercut it. On only one day in its four years did the world market price get down to the maximum agreement price. It never got inside the agreement's price range.

But this may have been an aberration due to temporary factors which no longer prevail. In the last four years Argentina has had very little wheat to sell - though now she has a big carry-over - partly because of bad luck

with the weather but also because her industrialization plan militated against her agricultural exports.

Changed Conditions
Today all that is being altered Argentina has much more wheat to sell - partly because of better luck with the weather this year but also because her new five-year economic plan holds a much better balance between industry and its agrarian base.

She still had some preferential barter and bilateral markets, but they leave her with a lot to sell competitively. Britain, the biggest importer, has gone out of the business of bilateral and barter arrangements at artificial prices, having at last recognized that they simply undermine sterling. Turkey, reputed to have an unprecedentedly big export surplus of wheat, is still trying to move it at inflated prices by barter deals. Argentina and Britain have learned better.

Russia's Premier, Georgi Malenkov has promptly followed Argentina's President Juan Peron in discovering the fallacy of wrecking agriculture for the sake of distorted industrialization.

It may take Russia and the satellites longer than Argentina to rectify it. They lack Argentina's natural advantages, and their agriculture at present seems to be in a shocking state. But when they do get around to it they may be another menace to the International Wheat Agreement and to North America's grain export markets.
