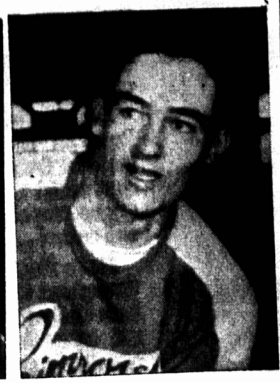

Helfand Orders Charges Filed Against Promoters

NEW YORK (AP)—Julius Helfand, chairman of the New York state athletic commission, ordered his counsel to file charges against the Monday night fight promoters at St. Nicholas Arena Monday as he reaped additional rewards for his victory over the Boxing Guild of New York.

Although Helfand approved a Jan. 16 match for St. Nick's, he said he had instructed that charges be pressed against promoters Felix Sullivan and Willie Gilzenberg and their London Sporting Club "on the Maryland situation and other matters."

Helfand said last Thursday he intended to call a hearing to find out if Sullivan and Gilzenberg violated the law forbidding association with known criminals when they sought to transfer their operations from New York to Baltimore, effective Jan. 23. The Baltimore deal was nullified when Maryland governor McKeldin asked the commission to revoke its permission.

Despite the fact that Helfand set a Jan. 16 deadline for all guild managers to divorce themselves from the organization or lose their licenses, he said he approved a Jan. 16 match because he thought it "necessary not to penalize the fighters or anyone else connected with it."

Russian Skiers Thawed Out In Swiss Sunshine

WENGEN, Switzerland (AP)—Russian skiers, invading the West this January to enter the Winter Olympic Games for the first time, have thawed out somewhat in the sunshine of Switzerland.

When the 30-man Russian squad first arrived at Wengen's Victoria hotel, team manager Viacheslav Zakhavine insisted on keeping the team's skis locked up in separate rooms at the hotel when not in use.

After a few days, however, the Russians dropped this precaution and racked up their skis in the common ski room at the hotel.

The same thawing out happened in the hotel. Many ski squads still were at the Victoria for the 13-nation Wengen meet just finished.

The first time the Russians entered the dining room—all eyes on them—they marched in a grim formation, eyes ahead, one man back of the other, all wearing blue serge suits.

In a couple of days here, however, they soon began straggling in to eat alone or in pairs. They began to lounge around the lobby in comfortable ski attire, laughing and joking.

HAVE HARD "ICK The Russians had some hard luck with injuries. Olga Lyenko impaled herself on a broken wooden slalom pole marking the course and was taken to hospital. Viktor Panov of the men's team smashed into a tree and broke three ribs in the men's downhill event at Wengen.

The Russian accidents made them appreciate all the more a spectacular tumble down an almost sheer 200-foot drop by Lester Streeter of Norwich, Vt., of the American squad.

Streeter wound up in the midst of a group of Russians who couldn't believe he was unhurt. They later awarded him a makeshift medal for his achievement.

Parker Wins Unanimous Decision Over Arthur

TORONTO (CP)—James J. Parker, 28-year-old heavyweight from Barrie, Ont., Monday night scored a unanimous 12-round decision over Johnny Arthur, South African champion from Johannesburg, for the Canadian version of the British Empire boxing title.

A crowd of about 5,000 in Maple Leaf Gardens saw Parker take over from the opening bell and African who now has lost six decisions in 34 professional matches. Parker weighed 213, Arthur 218 1/2.

The Canadian Boxing Federation and Ontario Athletic Commission ruled that the empire crown would be at stake but the British Boxing Board of Control refused to recognize it as a title bout, saying that the idle Don Cockell of London, England, still is the Empire champ.
