Kennedy Scores Winner; Habs Tie, Hawks Lose

BOSTON (CP)—Bernie Parent, Boston's rookie goalie, registered his first National Hockey League shutout as Boston Bruins defeated Toronto Maple Leafs 2-0 Sunday night on third-period goals by Forbes Kennedy and Al Langlois. Parent, called up from Oklahoma City of the Central League after injuries to Ed Johnston and Jerry Cheevers two weeks ago, turned in a sparkling performance in helping the Bruins to their second victory in nine games this year. Kennedy broke the scoreless deadlock and spoiled Johnny Bower's bid for career shutout No. 27 by backhanding home a rebound at 7:53 of the final period. Langlois, a veteran defenseman acquired from Detroit Red Wings during the off-season, padded the Boston lead with a brilliant scoring effort at 14:07. Langlois took a pass from Ed Westfall, roared past Toronto defenseman Bobby Baun and lifted a 25-footer over to Bower's left.

STOPPED ALL SHOTS The 20-year-old Parent took care of the rest as he kicked out everything the Leafs shot at him in their vain bid to overtake Boston. Parent finished with 30 saves, two more than Bower, and was given a standing ovation by the crowd of 15,648 for the final 60 seconds. Kennedy, recalled recently from San Francisco of the Western league, cashed in after he and teammates Tom Williams and Reggie Fleming applied tremendous pressure on the Toronto defence. Fleming backhanded a shot from 10 feet and Kennedy swiped the rebound past Bower. The Bruins were outshot by a 12-4 margin in the second period, but the Leafs were unable to break through Parent.

Midway through the period, Toronto had a 4-3 advantage in skaters for 51 seconds, but Boston defenseman Leo Bolvin broke up the only scoring threat. Bolvin broke his stick, dropped it and then made a dive to stop a shot by Dave Keon, stationed 15 feet outside a jam near the crease. NEW YORK 4 CHICAGO 2 CHICAGO (AP)—The hustling New York Rangers out-skated and out-muscled Chicago Black Hawks for the full 60 minutes to gain a 4-2 National Hockey League victory Sunday night. The triumph, their fourth of the young season, moved the surprising New Yorkers to within two points of second-place Hawks. By losing their second game in a row, the Hawks fell low points back of the league-leading Canadiens, who were tied Sunday night by Detroit. The Rangers sewed up the contest with a three-goal outburst in the first period. Gary Peters stole the puck away from Bobby Hull early in the second period and went in alone to beat Hull for the Rangers' insurance marker. Teammate Arnie Brown had just gotten

out of the penalty box when Peters made his move. Fred Stanfield picked up Chicago's second tally in the final period. Ed Giacomin, the Rangers' rookie goalie, turned in a solid performance in handling 31 of the 33 shots the Hawks aimed at him. OTTAWA (CP)—Hamilton Tiger-Cats rallied from a 13-point half-time deficit to edge Ottawa Rough Riders 18-13 in the opener Sunday of their two-game total-point Eastern Football Conference playoff. By DAN POWERS CALGARY (CP)—Calgary Stampeders grabbed a one-game lead in the best-of-three Western Football Conference final Saturday when they exploded for two last-quarter touchdowns and clinched a 27-9 victory over Winnipeg Blue Bombers. About 21,500 fans, shivering in 20-degree cold, watched Stampeders cling to a slim 10-9 lead going into the final quarter before they moved ahead for good. Up to that point the two clubs fought a belting defensive battle on a frozen field. Second game of the series will be played in Winnipeg Wednesday. A third game, if necessary, would be in Calgary Nov. 20. Defensive halfback Larry Robinson led Stampeders with nine points on two field goals, two converts and a single. Both field goals came off Bomber fumbles. The fourth-quarter touchdowns came on a 53-yard passing play from Eagle Day to end Herman Harrison and on a 59-yard gallop by fullback Lovell Coleman. STAMPS TOOK OVER Calgary halfback Ted Woods picked up the third Stampeders touchdown on a 17-yard charge in the second quarter. The score was set up when Bombers fumbled on a third-down punting situation and Stampeders took over. The lone Winnipeg touchdown was scored in the third quarter by end Farrell Fuston on a 10-yard pass from quarterback Kenny Flood. Halfback Ed Ulmer booted two singles and tackle Norm Winton converted Fuston's touchdowns. The victory pushed Stampeders a step closer to their first WFC championship and chance at the Grey Cup since 1949. Bombers won their last Grey Cup in 1962.
