FED. OF AGRICULTURE NEWSLETTER

Directors Will Consider Items For Annual Brief

For the first time since the annual meeting on Jan. 9 the 1962 Provincial Board of Directors of the federation will be meeting next Tuesday. One matter which will receive considerable attention will be that of presenting a brief to the members of the legislature, and the matters which should be emphasized in it. The resolutions which were passed at the annual meeting will be considered in the light of what disposition is to be made of them. An informal request for some organization assistance in the poultry industry will be dealt with, and plans for the series of meetings which will take place during the week of March 18 will be gone into. Incidentally the Dairymen's Association has chosen March 21 as the date for its annual meeting.

PULP WOOD MATTERS

While Prince Edward Island is not regarded as a lumber province yet income from trees is probably greater than realized. Fire wood, lumber fencing material, and pulp wood are all important, the latter appearing in the eastern and western part of the province.

From a commercial standpoint the pulp wood is likely the most important export. While not always regarded as an agricultural product it is treated as such in some provinces notably Quebec. Sometime ago in that province pulp wood was placed under a marketing board and minimum prices set which the pulp mills were required to pay. The mills countered by undertaking to increase their operations on their own limits. Following this move an act was

passed by the Quebec legislature requiring the mills to purchase a high percentage of their requirements from the farmers.

An interesting situation now exists where pulp wood producers in Quebec and on the New Brunswick border are getting in the vicinity of \$20 a cord for rough pulp while the New Brunswick producer receives in the vicinity of \$12. Understandably the New Brunswick operator inclines him to some serious thinking on the economic facts of life as related to pulp wood. During the course of the farm meetings in Montreal delegates from Nova Scotia and New Brunswick with representatives from our province as well met to consider what action, if any, might be taken to improve the situation in these provinces. Arrangements were made for the gathering of information on what was being done in Quebec and also what is proposed or suggested in New Brunswick. It is the intention that information be made available from a central office to all who may be concerned. As a point of interest it is reported that when the pulp mills cut their own wood the cost is in the vicinity of \$30 per cord. The board price in Quebec is in the vicinity of \$20 and at the roadside in northern New Brunswick \$11 and \$12 per cord. Obviously these figures justify some questions which pulp wood people would like to have answered.

TELETYPE MARKETING
Next Monday evening the Farm Forums will be studying one of the wonders of the electronic age as related to the marketing of hogs in Ontario. Marketing by teletype is the subject of the discussion and from the various material submitted. Farm Forum people will get a clear idea of how the miracle works.

Satisfaction with the system in respect to hogs is leading the Ontario poultry producers to seriously consider the setting up a similar plan for eggs. FARMERS AND CABINET

On Feb 7 the executive of the Canadian Federation of Agriculture met the cabinet to present the annual brief on behalf of Canadian agriculture. The brief dealt with matters arising out of decisions made at the annual meeting of the organization held in January. The brief of necessity must confine itself to the general problems affecting agriculture. The more detailed matters will be dealt with at levels below the cabinet. We would expect that one of the major problems to be discussed is the situation in the dairy industry. In addition, the critical situation developing out of last year's crop failure in large areas of the West will receive attention and for a third important area the need of improved national marketing legislation will be suggested. While in practice few farmers have the opportunity of meeting the cabinet, yet in theory all farmers who support the Federation of Agriculture do have an opportunity of having their case stated. Individual reaction to adult education will range all the way from agreement on its necessity and importance to the other end of the scale with such statements as "You cannot teach adults."

Adult education may be divided into two main areas, remedial and continuing. Obviously the first category refers to programs designed to help those

whose formal education was cut off or who need additional training to fit them for an occupation. The continuing branch actually involves everyone through all levels to the university graduate who must also continue to make efforts to keep up to date. Adult education may not have received the attention it deserves due to the fact that there appears to have been more emphasis on the informal type related to developing better citizens and individuals more responsive to community responsibilities. More recently increased attention is being focused on the formal type of adult education tending towards training for improved employment. The possibility exists that both these main areas that the whole field of adult education will receive increased interest through the attention being directed to the formal type.
