Indian Urges World To Throw Away A-Weapons

UNITED NATIONS, N.Y., (AP)—India's V. K. Krishna Menon called on the world Tuesday to

renounce war and to throw away its atomic weapons. "There is only one way before the world and that is for the nations to renounce war as an instrument of national policy," Krishna Menon said at the end of a two-hour speech closing the general debate in the United Nations General Assembly.

"Disarmament is not the way. We can establish peace only if the nations have decided to abandon war. That is possible once confidence is established. You cannot reconcile dreams with schemes."

Krishna Menon again urged a

halt on experiments with nuclear weapons pending an international agreement on disarmament. Krishna Menon was one of the leaders in obtaining the 26-to-27 vote last Friday by which the General Assembly decided to consider the flaming Algerian issue. As a result of that vote the French delegation walked out of the assembly. Krishna Menon appealed Tuesday to the French to return. He said consideration of a subject is not intervention and India's only aim is to help conciliate the differences between the French government and the Algerians. Krishna Menon said it is in the world interest to seek an early solution of the problem of Red China entering the UN. He long

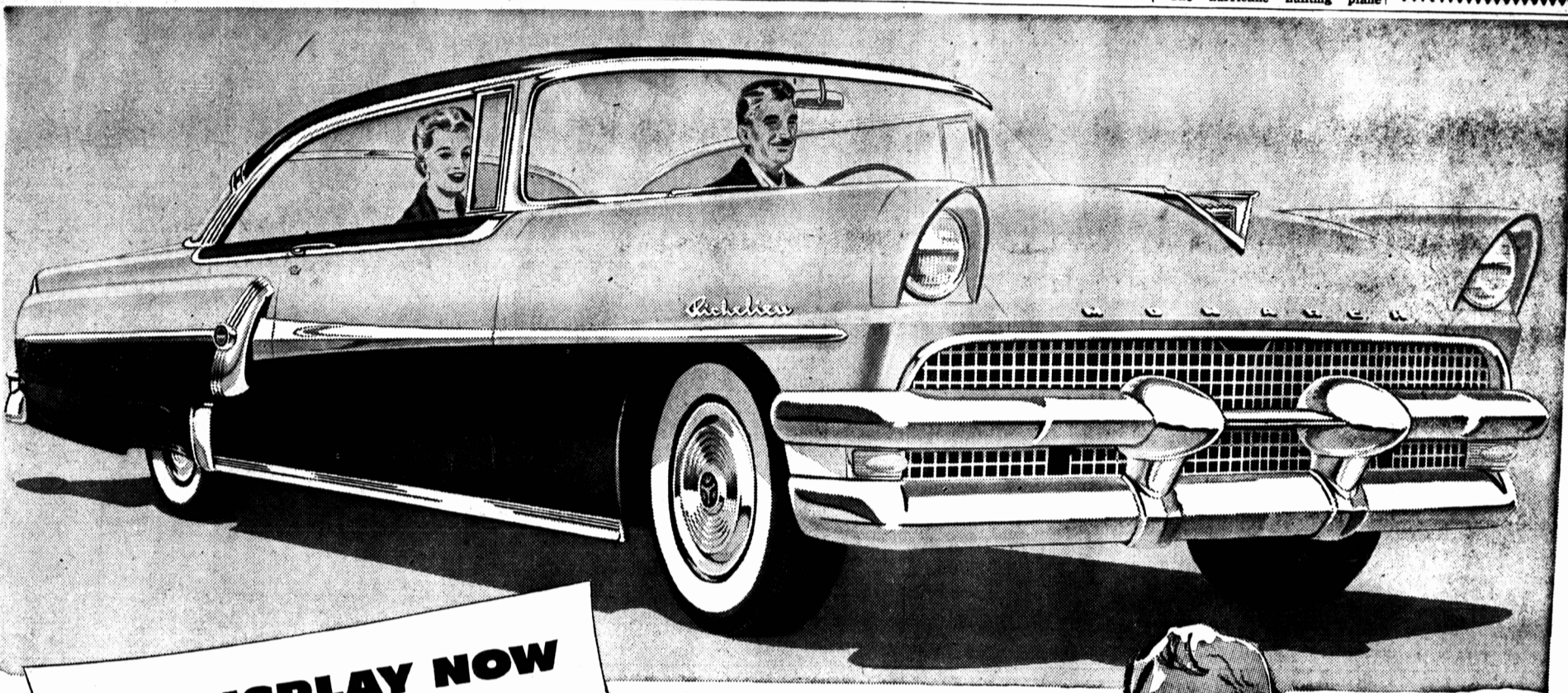
