## Overseas Study Made Possible By Scholarships

Sackville, N. B. — Six graduates of Mount Allison are at present studying at the University of London through the generosity of Lord Beaverbrook who in 1950 established at Mount Allison the Lord Beaverbrook Overseas Scholarships to give carefully selected students the benefit of a year, and in some cases two years, of post graduate work in London.

Ann Steel of Saint John, N. B. is now completing her second year in the field of Latin and Greek classical studies in London. Miss Steel was awarded from Mount Allison in 1948 with a magna cum laude degree in Arts and first class honours in English. She later received her M. A. degree in English from Toronto University and then returned to Mount Allison to complete honours work in Greek and Latin.

Elizabeth Brown, formerly of Campbellton, N. B., now on leave from the teaching staff in Halifax, N. S., was elected a scholar last year and is registered at the Institute of Education which is affiliated with the University of London. Miss Brown was graduated from Mount Allison in 1949 cum laude with honours in History. She refers to the University of London as a small United Nations and is finding student life in London stimulating and challenging.

Brad Smith of Hamilton, Ontario, a magna cum laude graduate with honours in History is pursuing further work in this field and Robert McKay of New Glasgow who is an honours graduate magna cum laude in the field of Philosophy and Psychology is another scholar who is profiting by his year overseas preparatory to theological studies when he returns to Canada. Donald Cameron of Meadowville Station, N. S. a Science graduate of 1950 who has entered the teaching profession, is finding his course in Education very worth while and London itself an inexhaustible field for study. Norman Eastman, an outstanding graduate of the Mount Allison School of Fine Arts is studying at the Slade School in London where, although guided by some of the best men in the field of Art of the day, he finds there is complete freedom of style, subject and medium for the student.

These students, in addition to academic work, are observing life and customs in London and are being influenced by the older cultures of the Motherland as well as newer trends in these post war years. What may be most important they are all developing a new appreciation of the value of closer associations with British life and thought.

The Selection Committee will meet in February to select the new overseas scholars to go to London in September, 1953. They will be chosen from high ranking graduates between the years 1949-1953 allowing a student who has completed at least two years of a course at Mount Allison in a course which can not be completed at Mount Allison and who has subsequently obtained a degree in this course at another recognized university since 1949 or will receive the degree in 1953, is eligible. ## Prominent Doctor, Former Islander, Dies In Mass. At 96

Dr. John A. Bruce, 96, prominent physician of Everett, Boston and Quincy, died Wednesday January 14th, at his home, 91 Alstead St., North Quincy, Mass. He was a former member of the staffs of Whidden Hospital, Everett, Malden Hospital and Lawrence Memorial Hospital, Medford.

He was a member of Beausant Commandery, K.T. of Malden, Signet Royal Arch Chapter of Masons of Charlestown, Aleppo Temple of the Shrine in Boston and the Massachusetts Medical Society.

He is survived by his wife and a daughter, Mrs. Josephine Chapin of North Quincy.

Dr. Bruce was born and reared at Grandview, Prince Edward Island. His younger brother Daniel, graduate of McGill medical college, who had practised his profession in Quincy for more than fifty years, died there eight years ago, at the age of 81.

Funeral services were held Friday afternoon from the John Hall Funeral Home, Cottage Ave., Quincy.

The scholarships are open to men and women and provide for one year's study but a scholar may be granted an extension of the scholarship for a second year if recommended by the Beaverbrook Scholarship Committee in London.

The scholarships are most generous, and provide for travelling expenses to Britain and return, university tuition fees, normal living expenses during the academic year and travel within the United Kingdom during the vacation periods.

Names of the new scholarship winners will be announced by the end of February. Applications will be received until February 10 by the Secretary of the Mount Allison Selection Committee.

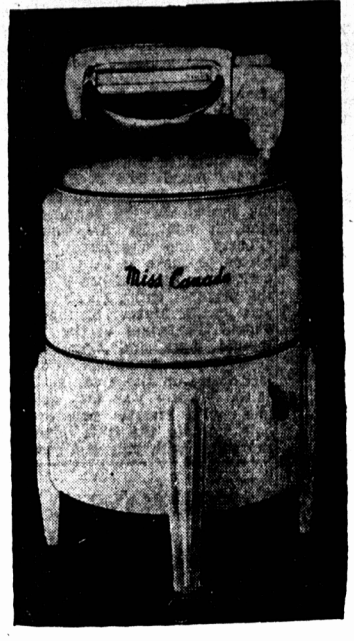

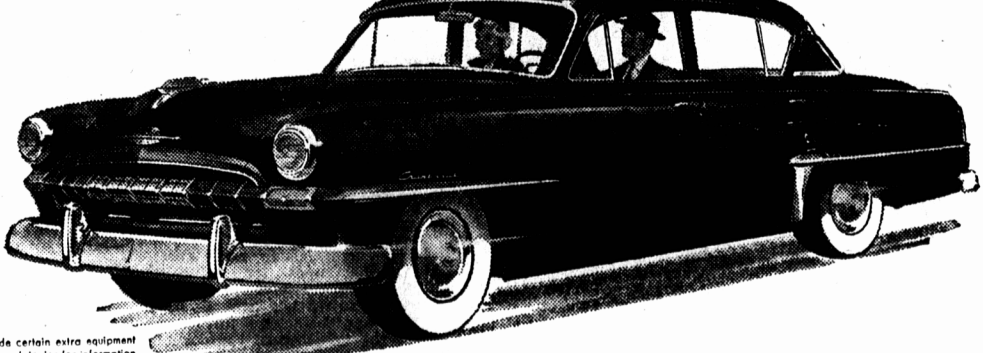
