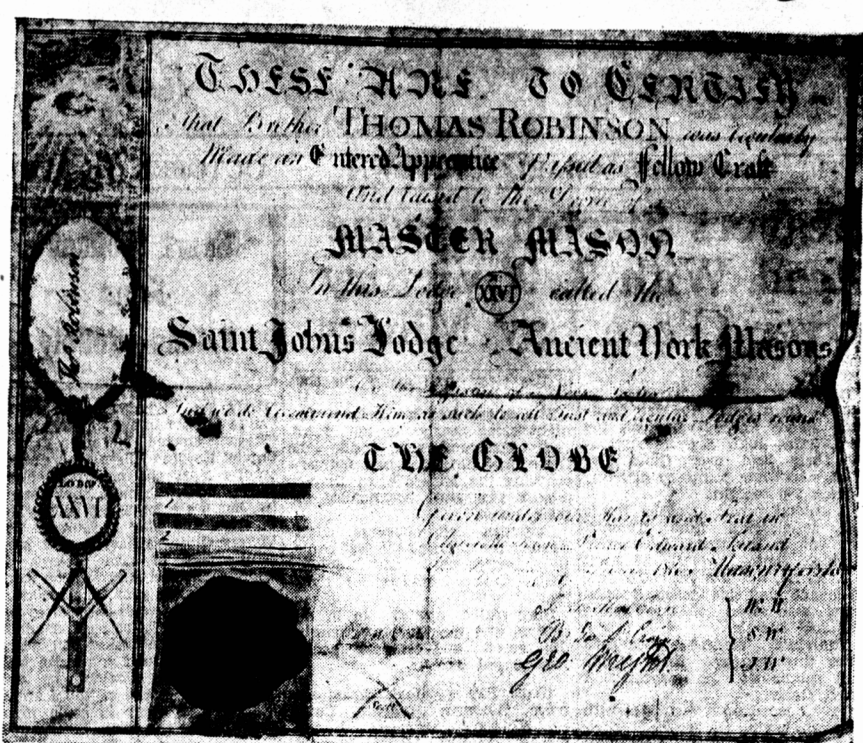

Oldtime Certificate Presented At Masonic Visitation Last Night



The above Masonic certificate dated June 19, 1810 of T. Arthur Robinson as a member of St. John's Lodge, Charlottetown, was presented to that Lodge last night on behalf of Robinson's granddaughters, the Misses Robinson.

An official visitation was made last night by Grand Master J. P. Millar, accompanied by Grand Steward, Ralph Monckey; Grand Secretary, E. C. MacMillan; Junior Grand Steward, Fulton Robertson; Grand Tyler, Chester Palmer; Past Grand Masters: W. J. Drake, G. E. Full, H. E. Ward, T. G. Ives, T. A. Dawson, W. R. Carson, H. R. Carruthers.

The certificate bears the signatures of (Col.) J. F. Holland, W.M.; B. De St. Croix, S.W.; (Hon.) Geo. Wright, J.W.; and Ewen Cameron, Secretary. The Thomas Robinson named in the certificate provided a meeting place for St. John's Lodge from 1811 until 1827. He laid the cornerstone of the new Jail building here in 1830. His father was Col. Joseph Robinson of the South Carolina Royalists.

Gov't Gets Tips On How To Cut Cost of Living

OTTAWA, Oct. 29 (CP) - The Federal Government was told today that an embargo on Canadian meat exports to the United States and larger loans to farmers for production improvements could help to reduce the cost of living in this country.

The Social Credit group was convinced that the policies the government had adopted to fight inflation had "failed and failed miserably." It would approve of certain temporary controls until the government developed sounder policies.

Turning to veterans affairs, he urged that the Dependents' Allowance Board be reconstituted and special consideration be given for dependents of men fighting in Korea. Many were in financial difficulties.

Mr. Balcer, speaking in French, said that if an embargo were placed on exports to the United States Western beef producers would still be able to make a reasonable profit on their sales in Eastern Canada.

T. J. Kieckham (L-Kings) suggested higher payments to rural mail carriers and for extension of veterans' pensions to those who have had ailments aggravated by war service.

Gordon Higgins (PC-St. John's East) urged that action be taken to reduce long-distance telephone calls and telegraph rates in Newfoundland.

Paul L. Dube (Ind. L-Restigouche-Madawaska) asked that pensions of retired employees of the Canadian National Railways be increased.

Tea Helps Settle Piracy Incident

HONG KONG, Oct. 29 (AP) - Diplomacy and a cup of strong tea settled an incident of piracy on the high seas.

Capt. R. E. Selwyn-Jones, 46, of the Hupeh said the 1,680-ton British steamship, hearing south from Communist Tientsin, was near the islands off the Yangtze Estuary, Thursday when a high speed motor junk with about 70 pirates aboard gave chase.

It fired 20 shells at the Hupeh. One passed through the cabin of chief engineer J. H. Johnson.

Selwyn-Jones ordered his ship to heave to. Twenty-eight pirates armed with guns, tommy and sub-machine guns clambered aboard.

They were "highly trained, efficient and courteous," Selwyn-Jones said. The 19 passengers were ordered to their cabins. The pirate leader apologized for the shooting. "Our job is a very dangerous one," he explained.

He asked if the Hupeh had sent out any distress signals. "Yes," Selwyn-Jones replied. "It was my job to do that just as you had a job to do."

Then the captain and the pirate retired to the bridge for tea.

Later the New Zealand destroyer Rotoiti appeared. Lt.-Cmdr. B. E. Turner agreed to grant the pirates safe conduct ashore if they would free the Hupeh and her passengers.

The pirates, carrying valuables taken from the passengers, clambered into the Hupeh lifeboat and were taken ashore at tiny Bella Vista Island.

The Hupeh and Rotoiti arrived Sunday in Hong Kong.

Opposed To Self-Government In The Sudan

KHARTOUM, Sudan, Oct. 29 (AP) - The pro-Egyptian Ashigga Party said today the Sudan constituent commission has no authority to speak for the Sudan's 8,000,000 people.

A statement in Mutamar, official party organ, assailed the British-appointed commission for asking the United Nations to set up an international commission to supervise steps toward self-government in the Sudan.

Fifty sources said Ashigga is sending two representatives to the U. N. General Assembly in Paris to support the union of Sudan with Egypt under the crown of King Farouk. They are Mubarak Zarog, party secretary, and Ibrahim Mufti, a member of the executive committee.

The Sudan commission was established by British Government General Sir Robert Howe. Ashigga claims Sir Robert has lost his powers because of Egypt's cancellation of the Anglo-Egyptian agreement on the Sudan.
