Dear J. D.: Here is your letter much condensed, giving an honest, unretouched picture of a nuisance grandmother. The only possible excuse one can make for her behavior is to suggest that she is emotionally sick, chronically depressed — and obstinately unwilling and progressively unable to stand on her own two feet in life.

She is tiresomely immature in her general department and grievances — and possibly your mother is entirely too patient with her.

Your grandmother's disagreeable approach to personal relations—her insistence on having her way of making the other person feel her displeasures—probably has given your mother an indelible guilt complex, in the daughter role. That's why she puts up with the perennial imposition of your grandma's bullying, nagging, whining routine.

Your grandmother's spite treatment of your mother, in return for her patience, is pretty sick conduct. It indicates that her personality is poisoned with envy, jealousy, malice, etc.—ugly feelings fomented by frustration; by failure to cultivate constructive character, and upbeat patterns of living, that lead to the satisfactions (and digested sorrows) of maturity.

PROFIT BY MORAL TRIAL
You say she has a nice apartment, maid service, her own private phone—and she telephones daddy or mother to come get her. If they can't oblige, she arrives in a cab. And she may go back to her place that night, or she may not; she may stay on at your house for weeks.

This amounts to panicky flight from the emptiness of her life
