

of glass were broken in the house of the Hon. C. Hensley, on the Priceton Road, and 95 panes of glass in Milton Church.

The accounts from the Eastward are equally deplorable. On both sides of the Hillsborough the devastating effects of the storm may be traced in prostrated fields of grain and other crops, but to what distance it extended we have as yet been unable to learn.

During the continuance of the storm, and for some hours after, the face of the country presented the appearance of winter. The ground was covered with hailstones, to the depth of three inches, and the greatest apprehensions are entertained that the crops over a large extent of country are irretrievably ruined.

Being present at the Court in Georgetown for a short time when the Grand Jury were sitting, I had the advantage of seeing them, also of hearing the names, &c., of most of them; and, with very few exceptions, a Grand Jury certainly they were!

I do not know whether your Editorial comments were intended to convey a censure on the Crown Officers or the Government—for I guess, Mr. Editor, that the Novascotian has drawn you out lately pretty considerably in this way—but if they were, I think you would have done it effectually, and much more appositely, by charging them with the exhibition of such mockery as to attempt to investigate and try by Juries of King's County, a case of riot, &c., by those of its own inhabitants, perpetrated under colour of political grievances, and of such a serious nature as that which so notoriously took place in that disaffected section of this otherwise peaceable and happy Colony.

It is true that the first foreman of the Jury was unable from illness to attend to his duties; and that a few others, being nearly all of the independent and educated portion of them, were unconsciously led from theirs by the more savory attraction of the dinner hour, when the Jury were being sworn in, and, as it appeared, were thereby incapacitated from acting;—be it so; but if this had not been the case, it is doubtful whether the result would have been different.

We can never forget that the Doyle of Nova Scotia has ever been unceasing in his efforts for the prosperity of Fatherland. He was the first to stand forward among the ranks of his brother Repealers, to combat, by the aid of his powerful eloquence, the impotent threats of a hostile and tyrannical Ministry, that would fain crush a united and peaceable people, who are struggling, by constitutional agitation, to regain their indubitable right—a National and Independent Parliament.

The Irishmen of these Colonies should always hold in grateful remembrance the soul-stirring appeals addressed to them in the columns of the Register, the Editorial style of which you wield, with so much credit to yourself, and the sons of Ignatius Loyola, under whose fostering influence your budding talents were ripened into maturity.

Nor can we pass unnoticed your disinterested friendship to the amiable, virtuous, and learned Prelate, whose absence will be ever regretted in the land of his birth, and whom the inhabitants of Halifax revere and esteem.

On account of the accumulation of business, and the increase in the contributions to the Repeal Fund, the following additional Repeal Wardens were appointed:—Messrs. James Reade, Edward Kickham, John McCleary, William Toole, James Toole.

The Repeal Rent for the evening was announced by the Chairman to be Seven Pounds five shillings. This announcement was received with loud and reiterated cheers.

Mr. Slattery having vacated the chair, and Mr. Richard Walsh, R. W., having been called thereto, the thanks of the Meeting were voted to the Chairman, for his patriotic conduct in the chair. The meeting adjourned, sine die, after giving three cheers successively, for Queen Victoria, Daniel O'Connell, and Tom Steele, the Head Pacifier of all Ireland.

On Friday, the 28th ult., the Deputation waited upon Mr. Doyle with the Address, at the Victoria Hotel, to which he was pleased to make the following Reply:—

Mr. Chairman and Gentlemen; Having already expressed to your Deputation, an objection to compliments of a personal nature, I had hoped, from the interval which has elapsed, that I should have been relieved from the necessity of so sensibly feeling my own unprofitableness, in the unmerited congratulations with which you have been pleased to receive me.

I deeply feel the value of this honor; and if any regret can be permitted to mingle with my sensations, it arises from the slight title to this distinction possessed by its object.

The fervour of the zeal you manifest in the cause of struggling Ireland, and the hostility you express to the misrule and oppressiveness of a Government whose policy has proved so pernicious to the prosperity of your Fatherland, find an emphatic commentary within my bosom, and I should only enfeeble, by any attempt of mine, the energies of denunciation with which it has been so often and so eloquently rebuked.

That the day for the fulfilment of the Nation's hopes is not far distant, I sanguinely believe; and that the gloom and darkness which now brood over the green land, will only serve to herald and usher in the break and rise of a glorious sunlight upon the destinies of Ireland.

Remote as we are in these Dependencies of the Realm, it would ill become us to forget, in our exile, the duties we owe to a home, endeared by all the charms which lie in the reminiscences of childhood—hallowed for ages by the ashes of an ancestry who fought for their faith and their fatherland; and still additionally consecrated by the heart-woven ties of a kindred yet upon the soil of their nativity, as prompt to sustain the true interest of their young and lovely Sovereign, as they are ready to resent the mischief or menace of her Ministry.

Irishmen throughout the Sisterhood of the Colonies best shew their community of origin, by an identification in spirit, and proudly repudiate the imputation of degeneracy, by the ardour of their national sympathy. Of this the Repealers of P. E. Island have given a sincere and signal testimony.

Permit me, in conclusion, to convey to you my warm acknowledgments; and to wish you, all and each, a course of protracted happiness in this beautiful Isle of your adoption—an Isle whose soil and whose seas seem pregnant with the wealth of an unexampled productiveness.
