HALIFAX, Sept. 27.—Among the officers leaving South Africa with Major Pelletier are Capt. S. M. Rogers, H. B. Stairs, R. K. Baker, C. K. Fraser, Lieutenants F. C. Jones, L. Leduc, Surg.-Major C. W. Wilson, Rev. T. F. Fullerton and eight additional lieutenants, whose names are not given. The men remaining in South Africa are members of the permanent corps, drafts of reinforcements and about one hundred and fifty others.

Dr. Brymer is to be succeeded by Geo. E. Casey, M. P. for West Elgin.

THE GERMAN PROPOSALS

An Important Topic in Europe.

SPECULATION AS TO GREAT BRITAIN'S ANSWERS

Nothing Definite Known Yet as to Salisbury's Reply.

LONDON, Sept. 27.—The China question is again in the phase of discussion of stability of the European concert and the likelihood of Germany's finding it convenient to modify her aggressive attitude.

According to a Yokohama correspondent of The Daily Mail, Japan assents to Germany's proposal, but at the same time strongly urges that there shall be no prolonged delay in the negotiations. The same authority says that Japan would decline to follow Germany in pursuing the Imperial court into the interior of China.

The Berlin correspondent of the Associated Press showed the German foreign office a private despatch from London asserting that Lord Salisbury had informed the German ambassador to Great Britain that the reply of the British government to the German note would agree with that of the United States.

A high foreign official re-read the advices from the German ambassador and then said that Lord Salisbury has asked for a few days in which to consider the matter, desiring to procure certain information before giving a final reply. His repeated emphasizing, publicly, the non-receipt of a formal answer has given the impression that the London advices of the Associated Press concerning the matter are correct, the opinion being that the German foreign office still clings to the hope of winning England over.

The papers, taking their cue from the foreign office, flatly deny that Great Britain is arrayed with the United States against the German proposal.

RACES ON WEDNESDAY.

The Poetess Wins the 2 35 Class—
Other Races Unfinished.

The races yesterday afternoon were called at two o'clock. The track was somewhat heavy. Dr. Reid, of Guelph, Ontario, made an excellent starter, and he had able assistants in Mr. Gec. F. Hughes and Mr. A. P. Woodbury. Mr. W. A. Noyes and Ald. Brown held the watches. Mr. C. E. M. Kinnon was clerk of the course. Mr. J. Lightizer was distance judge, but as there were no drags on the track he had a cinch.

Three horses faced the starter in the 2 35 class, the first event carded. They were The Poetess, Brilliant and Ben Hal. Brilliant had the pole, The Poetess having second position with Ben Hal on the outside.

They were sent away on the third score, and at the first turn Brilliant was leading by a length, which lead he increased considerably by the time the half mile was covered. On entering the back stretch Ben Hal broke and fell behind three lengths. The Poetess in the meantime had reached Brilliant's wheel, and on the home stretch passed the leader, as also did Ben Hal. They came under the wire in this order, Ben Hal being only half a length behind the winner.

They got the word on the first score in the second heat. The Poetess was leading at the first turn. Brilliant took the lead from her soon afterwards, however, and Ben Hal, which broke badly, fell behind. There was no change in the positions at the half. Down the back stretch The Poetess began to gain on the leader, and coming up to the wire captured the place landed a winner with Brilliant a close second.

The spectators did not think Brilliant was driven to win in the second heat, and there were many requests made by the grand stand for a change of drivers. The judges also thought there was something wrong, and replaced Irving by Harry Lydiard in the third heat. For the first half there was a sharp fight for the lead between The Poetess and Brilliant, with Ben Hal a good third. After passing the

half, however, Brilliant began to fall back and The Poetess obtained a snug lead. Brilliant cut in upon the chestnut on the stretch, and obtained first place, which he maintained. The judges, however, gave the heat and race to The Poetess, putting Brilliant back to third place.

There six starters in the 2 24 class, viz, Brazilian, Parkland, Guy J, Billmont, Minnie and Rock Farm Grace, drawing positions in the order named.

It took thirteen scores to effect a start. Billmont led until after rounding the first turn when Brazilian captured that position. Brazilian held the lead until coming up to the wire, when Billmont, forged ahead and finished a winner with half a length to spare. There was not much difference between the other horses. Rock Farm Grace finished fourth, but was put back two places for making a long break. The time came off the wheel of Brazilian's sulky in this heat.

There was less trouble in getting a start in the second heat, the word being given on the fourth score. Grace took the lead at an early stage of the game and was never headed, although Brazilian fought hard for the coveted position and finished a close second, Guy J and Billmont also put up a good race, and they were not far behind the leaders at the finish. Minnie held fourth place until entering the stretch on the second half when she broke and fell to the rear. Parkland finished fifth.

In the third heat they got the word after scoring five times. Brazilian captured the lead from Grace before the quarter was reached and held it throughout. Billmont finished a good second. Grace came under the wire third, but was put back two places for breaking; Parkland, which finished fourth, was put back a place for the same offence. Guy J was given third place and Minnie fourth.

Brazilian also captured the fourth heat, holding the lead from start to finish. Billmont finished second, about a length behind Brazilian, but having made a bad break in the first quarter was relegated to third place. Guy J., which finished third was given second place. Grace was fourth, Minnie fifth and Parkland was at the end of the party.

In the fifth heat Brazilian held from position until entering the stretch on the last half when Billmont came to the front and passed under the wire about half a length ahead, Grace finished third, Guy J. fourth and Minnie last.

There were only three starters in the sixth heat, the horses that had not won a first place having been sent to their stables. It was thought that either Brazilian or Billmont would win and thus end the race, but Grace disappointed the knowing ones by finishing first by a nose, with Billmont second and Brazilian third. The judges decided that the seventh heat, which will determine the winner, should be trotted on Thursday at one o'clock.

Between the heats of the races, Mr. Dewell, one of the cleverest trapeze performers seen here for a long time, demonstrated his skill, and was heartily applauded by the large audience. Kelly and Ashby, comic actors and acrobats, also gave an exhibition of the best description, their clever work being greeted with round after round of applause.
