

18 Centennial Projects Are Approved For Island

A total of \$262,467 has been allocated for 18 approved Centennial projects in Prince Edward Island, it was indicated in a recent Centennial Commission release. The funds provided for the Centennial projects come from the federal, provincial and municipal governments. The major portion of the Centennial projects' budget will be spent on four recreational structures, which will cost approximately \$190,000. Four parks will also be constructed, at a cost of \$42,000 and six community centers at a cost of \$22,000. Other community projects include the construction of two recreational areas, a memorial and an historical book. The approved projects and their estimated cost include the following: Summerside, swimming pool, \$100,000; Parkdale, construction of a recreational park, between Kensington Road and St. Peters Road, \$10,000; Sherwood, construction of a community playground, \$23,000; Montague, artificial ice plant, \$36,000; Alexandra, a book of the district's history, \$650; Brackley Point School district, additional facilities to the hall, \$1,000; Murray River, public park and playground, \$3500; St. Eleanors, a lych-gate leading to the grave of W.H. Pope, \$3,000; Georgetown, development and beautification of the town square, \$5,000; Cornwall, recreational playground, \$1500; Mt. Stewart, recreational room - an addition to the present facilities, \$4500; Covehead, West Covehead and Stanhope, addition of modern facilities to each community, \$2,000; Cape Wolfe, community hall, \$1500; Borden, additional facilities for the rink, \$4100; construction of Pownal rink, \$50,000; Kilmuir, renovation of the historical building, \$1100; Wellington, construction of a community park, \$10,000; St. Edwards, St. Louis and Miminigash, recreational park \$3300. Other Island points where projects are in the development stage and have not yet been approved are: Charlottetown, Alberton, Athena Regional High School, Cardigan, Ellerslie-Bideford school district, Kensington, Kinkora, Miscouche, North Wiltshire, O'Leary, Souris, North Rustico, and the Charlottetown Rural Regional High School. As a result of the Fathers of Confederation Building, which was erected as a joint effort on the part of the various levels of government, other provinces are now constructing major Confederation memorials. The total cost of the 11 memorials to be built in other provinces and two territories is approximately \$90 million. The largest of these is Toronto's Centre of Science and Technology which will cost \$21.7 million.

OLD FLASK IS VALUABLE

LONDON (AP) - A piece of crockery that a household complained interfered with her cleaning was sold Monday for \$75,000.

A spokesman for the auctioneers, Christie's, said: "For years it has been in the possession of a certain Yorkshire family. It sat on the dining-room floor beside a sideboard. In her daily cleaning the maid often complained it got in the way of the vacuum cleaner."

Several weeks ago, Anthony du Boulay, an expert on porcelains and oriental ceramics, spotted it and identified it as a magnificent early Ming blue and white flask from the first quarter of the 15th century.

Only two other copies are known to exist, said the spokesman. One is in a Peiking museum, the other in the Percival David collection at London University. "It's just about the most important piece of porcelain discovered since World War II," said the spokesman. The owner insisted on remaining anonymous. The buyer was a London dealer. The owner was unable to say when the flask came into his family's possession.

Panamanian Ship Grounds

HALIFAX (CP) - Forty-three crew members were taken off the Panamanian freighter Teagan Monday after she struck a rock near the mouth of Halifax harbor and began to fill with water.

Her captain and first mate remained aboard until nightfall and declined to be rescued. They finally were persuaded to board a helicopter and abandon the ship.

A rising swell from the Atlantic increased the danger the 7,300-ton freighter might slip from the rock and sink. A salvage tug and a Canadian Coast Guard cutter stood by. The Teagan, manned by a Greek crew, rammed into a reef known as The Sisters about 2 a.m. Monday while approaching the harbor in a light fog. The ship carried no cargo, but was to be fitted-out at Halifax for grain-carrying.

New Song For World's Fair Is Given First Performance

MONTREAL (CP) - A new song, written to a Latin beat as the theme for the 1967 world's fair in Montreal, was given its official first performance Sunday night.

The lively words and music of the song meant \$6,000 in prizes for composer Stephane Venne, 25, of Montreal, whose offering was chosen from a total of 2,210 submitted from 35 countries.

The contest, opened May 17 and closed Aug. 31. About 47,000 notices giving details on the competition were sent around the world.

The song was chosen by what officials of Expo 67 called "a Canadian jury of five members."

It has been recorded in a combined English-French version, which will be made available around the world.

HAS WRITTEN 150 SONGS - Mr. Venne, who has written 150 songs, will derive additional income from the new song through the rights he has on it. The song lyrics originally were written in French. A translation into English was made by Marcel Steliman, of London, England.

The song's French title is Un Jour, Un Jour (One Day, One Day). The English version bears the title, Hey Friend, Say Friend.

The song's first performance was given as part of a bilingual variety show on the CBC's French-language television network.

The program is to be repeated on the corporation's English-language TV network Tuesday night.

The English lyrics in full: Hey friend, say friend, Come on over, How d'ya like to see

Continued from Page 1 of his own. But Mr. Knowles objected that his party's spokesman, Dr. William Howe (NDP - Hamilton South), had one to place before the House on an earlier session.

Dr. Ryndard indicated that the Conservatives will move to strike out the universality clause—the one requiring 90 per cent of a province's population to be covered at the start.

He recalled that the Canadian Medical Association has urged the government to proceed first with covering those who cannot afford to buy medical care insurance themselves.

An NDP amendment to broaden the range of insured services was ruled out of order on procedural grounds.

The amendment would have included "such other health and paramedical services as may be included in a provincial medical health care insurance plan."

Supporters of all opposition parties said this would include optometrists, psychologists, chiropractors, osteopaths, physiotherapists, x-ray technicians and other such practitioners.

Mr. MacEachen argued that it was clear from provincial laws that optometrists and chiropractors "are not members of the medical profession."

UPHOLDS MINISTER Chairman Herman M. Batten upheld this argument after a debate in which all opposition parties said Mr. MacEachen was narrowing the bill.

David Groos (L - Victoria) suggested paramedical services might be insured if recommended by a medical practitioner.

He said his sympathies were with the opposition.

A two-hour procedural wrangle developed over an attempt by Mr. Knowles to provide insurance benefits for optometrists services which, if rendered by a doctor, would be insured under the bill.

The dispute was unresolved by the time the debate was interrupted by a royal assent ceremony to give a four-month extension to the Bank Act, now under revision by Parliament.

It was decided at last night's meeting that future meetings will be held at various points across the Island to emphasize that the branch is intended for the welfare of all Island diabetics, with its function, said Mr. Praught, being to "help diabetics help themselves."

There are about 165 members in the local branch of the association, which has 32 branches across Canada with a total membership of 5,200 members. There are 1,010 known diabetics on P.E.I., and Mr. Praught said it is estimated that there are two to three unknown diabetics for every known sufferer from the disease.
