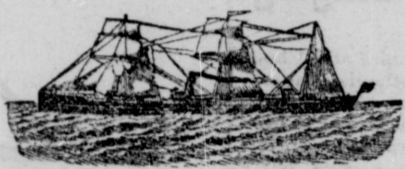

Notes and Comments.

—An epidemic of typhoid fever broke out in Sweden recently, and was traced through the milk supply to the family in which the first case occurred, thence to a well into which there leaked drippings from a manure heap twenty feet away. The milk cans were washed with this water every day, and when the practice was stopped the epidemic ceased.

—The Empire: The trade in horses which the Dominion does might be easily and largely increased. As we have often pointed out, Great Britain affords an immense market for certain breeds of horses, and it would well repay the expenditure if our farmers would devote more time and money to breeding the class of animals required. A British paper just to hand observes: "Again and again have we urged upon Canadian farmers the value of the British market for Canadian horses. As yet the result has been small, but the demand in this country for really first-class horses continues unabated, and formed the great feature of the business done at the great Horncastle fair last week. English hunters made from 70 to 210 guineas, and Irish from 60 to 140 guineas, one or two really tip-top animals making 200 guineas. There were but few good carriage horses, and these made up to about 150 guineas, the lowest price reported being 70 guineas. In the cart horse section there was no difficulty in getting purchasers for useful animals, which ranged generally from 35 to 60 guineas, a few of the best making 80 guineas.

—It looks as if the Canadian Pacific's unprecedented run across the continent had a fine effect upon the stock of that company in financial circles, as it reached 90 recently, which is the highest figure Canadian Pacific has ever attained.

"Yes, you think that is first rate," said a shrewd member of the Montreal stock exchange to the Empire, "but it will be quoted at 100 before you are a year older, mark my words."

In connection with the above facts and the above prediction, financial men are discussing the tremendous pecuniary sacrifice made by Hon. J. J. C. Abbott when the distinguished jurist accepted the Premiership, and in doing so gave instructions to his brokers to sell out all his interest in the Canadian Pacific.

"What did Mr. Abbott sell at?" asked the correspondent, "and how much is the Premier out of pocket, allowing for the recent heavy advance in that particular stock?"

"Had it been possible for the Hon. Mr. Abbott to hold on until the present time he would certainly be worth more by a round \$100,000 than he is to-day," was the broker's astonishing reply, and he added that this should be known by the people of Canada, who have certainly no idea of the great sacrifice which the leader of the Government imposed upon himself when he took the position he occupies to-day.

—The Farmers Alliance of the United States has advanced a good many startling political ideas. The following is the latest:—

"Steps should be taken to abolish all laws for the collection of all debts, which would be as much a matter of economy as of justice. The public, not being taken into the negotiations preceding the contraction of debts, ought not to be called in to compel their payment. Those who sell property or loan money do so in the hope or expectation of reaping a profit, and often grant the credit when they would not do so if the law did not stand behind them to enforce their claim. It would also induce those who loan money to invest it in some legitimate business. The abolition of such laws would permanently destroy credit business, and coupled with the government leasing money to its own working people, inaugurate the most prosperous time witnessed since the formation of society."

This proposal, is, the Halifax Herald remarks, receiving a good deal of attention from papers not friendly to the Alliance. It is represented as the acme of absurdity and dishonesty. But is it? In the first place it is not the first time that such a proposal has been made. It has been advanced repeatedly by men not accused of either insanity or dishonesty. And in the next place the principle is already known and acted on in what are known as "debts of honor." It is a well known fact that men will pay debts of honor before they will pay any other kind of debt. Does it therefore follow of necessity that all credit will be destroyed by making all debts of honor? That it would limit credit is undoubted. But that might not be such a very bad thing.

THE WHEAT YIELD.—Portage Plains, according to a Winnipeg despatch, present a wonderful sight at present. There are miles on miles of fields in which stocks of grain stand so close together that they occupy nearly a third of the ground. J. J. McRobbie, a farmer having the largest interest in that district, expects to have 50,000 bushels of wheat. Thirteen binders and 30 men have been hard at work for over a fortnight and it will take a day or two yet to finish up. It will take 3½ tons of twine to bind the crop on this farm, and two traction engines and separators will be busy all autumn threshing.

We regret to have to announce this week the death of Mr. Francis Smith, an esteemed and respected resident of North Melville Road, Lot 29, which sad event occurred at his residence on Thursday, the 3rd inst. Although Mr. Smith was in delicate health for some time past, no one dreamed that his end was so near; and his death therefore was a painful surprise to his many friends and acquaintances. Russian troops to the number of 150,000 have been ordered to Warsaw. This makes half a million troops on the Polish frontier.

Russian advices report the discovery of great coal oil fields in the region of the Caspian Sea. The production of these fields is said to be more than ten-fold greater than that of any other existing oil territory.
