diamond ace and, having carefully counted the diamonds in both hands, next led a low diamond to dummy's king! When East showed out—thus consigning declarer to inevitable defeat—South made a few unkind remarks about "the rule which prescribed the play for a drop."

It is very obvious that South knew too many "rules" and had not matriculated in the school of ordinary logic. With the club ace removed from dummy and no outside entry visible, a second-round diamond finesse was indispensable! South could well afford to lose a trick to the diamond queen if East had that card, doubleton, but he certainly could not afford to lose his communication to dummy, which was precisely what he did when he played the ace and king.

Instead of relying on "rules" a player must analyze for himself the possible outcomes of alternative lines of play.
