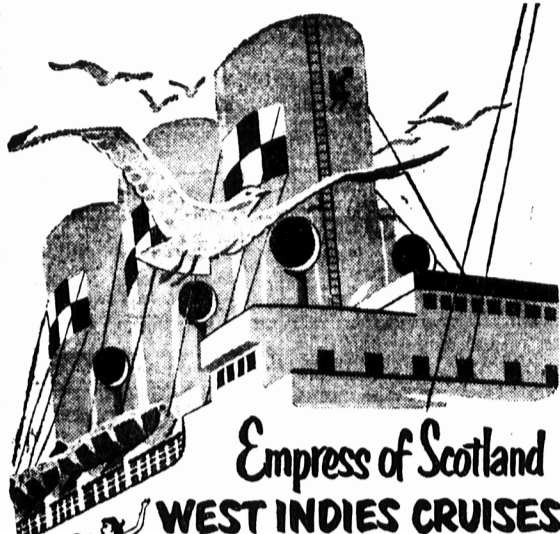

MR. HERBERT R. PROFITT

—Herbert Reid Profitt passed away at his home at Victoria on Wednesday, October 14 after a long period of failing health. The first born son of the late George Profitt and his wife, Annette Tuplin, of Burlington, he had lived in Victoria since 1908 and for the past 30 years had with his wife, the former Jessie Rogers, owned and operated the Orient Hotel, one of the Island's most popular Summer resorts. His genial kindly manner coupled with an unswerving integrity won for him a wide circle of friends who sincerely mourn his passing at the comparatively early age of 65 years.

MARTIN and LEWIS IN "THE STOOGES" AT CAPITOL, SUMMERSIDE

—One of the precepts of show business would have us believe that every comedian has a secret yearning to play Hamlet and that behind every clown there is a touch of Paganini. To some extent this belief has a basis in fact. For example, no one would dream that Dean Martin and Jerry Lewis, exponents of rip-roaring undisciplined and sassy comedy antics, could make a motion picture which had a deeply moving story full of pathos. Yet, Martin and Lewis have done exactly that in "The Stooges," the new Hal Wallis Paramount production which opens today at the Capitol Theatre, Summerside.

Not that Dean and Jerry have abandoned the field of uproarious humor, for "The Stooges" is full of the kind of comic cavorting that has made this gifted duo the top ranking stars of today. However, the laughs are complemented by a story which is emotionally gripping—a story of the heartbreak that show business sometimes deals to aspiring performers along the difficult climb to success.

Dean Martin is seen as a song-and-dance man who uses Jerry Lewis as the stooge of his act. Jerry is content to live in the shadow of his partner until a series of dramatic events makes them realize that they both need each other to an equal degree.
